GUIDELINES FOR CONGRESS BUSINESS

These guidelines provide a broad, but flexible, framework for dealing with Congress business and have been drawn up in accordance with the Rules of the Union. They are intended as guidelines for the President, Congress and the Standing Orders Committee itself.

1. CONGRESS

Congress is convened and delegates are elected subject to the provisions of the Union Rule Book. Congress shall conduct its business at the following times:

Congress - Sunday 5 June – Wednesday 8 June 9.30 am - 12.30 pm, 2.00 pm - 5.30 pm

Congress – Thursday 9 June 9.30 am - 12.30 pm

Changes in these times will be discussed between the President of Congress and the Standing Orders Committee.

2. STANDING ORDERS COMMITTEE

The Standing Orders Committee shall be appointed in accordance with Rule 9. The members of the Standing Orders Committee shall elect a chair from amongst their own number.

The Standing Orders Committee shall have power to recommend to Congress proposals on the conduct of Congress business as covered by these guidelines.

The Standing Orders Committee shall meet as and when may be necessary to arrange Congress business.

The Central Executive Council may appoint up to three Observers to advise Standing Orders Committee.

3. GENERAL MOTIONS AND RULE AMENDMENTS

Motions on general policy and to amend rules shall be placed on the agenda according to the provisions of the Rule Book.

It is the responsibility of the Standing Orders Committee at Congress to make recommendations to Congress for the handling of the agenda.

The Standing Orders Committee has three responsibilities in respect of Motions submitted to Congress:

- (1) The Committee shall determine whether or not each Motion is "in order" for debate at Congress i.e.
 - whether the Motion ought to be dealt with by a more appropriate body (for example a JIC or a Section or Delegate Conference);
 - whether, at a Congress which is not a Rules Revision Congress, the Motion conflicts with a rule, or is an explicit rule amendment or would require a consequential rule amendment to give effect to its provisions;
 - whether the Motion covers more than one subject;
 - whether, after consultation with the delegation, the provisions of the Motion are still relevant and appropriate to the present situation (i.e. whether the Motion has been "overtaken by events");
 - whether the wording of the Motion is incomprehensible;

- whether at a Rules Revision Congress, a rule amendment Motion would leave a rule deficient;
- whether the Motion conflicts with a previous Congress resolution that it does not expressly seek to overturn.

If a Motion comes within any of these categories, it shall be ruled "**out of order**" by the Standing Orders Committee, and the Committee shall recommend to Congress accordingly.

(2) The Committee shall make proposals to Regional delegations on the withdrawal of a Motion in favour of another Motion on the Congress agenda. In determining whether to recommend the withdrawal of a Motion, the Committee shall ensure that the principles and proposals incorporated in that Motion are fully covered by the Motion that will remain on the agenda.

A Regional delegation is entitled to reject the Committee's proposal to withdraw, and to allow its Motion to stand on the agenda.

If a Regional delegation agrees to the withdrawal of its Motion the Standing Orders Committee will, if it wishes, recommend the right to second the other Motion or the right to speak in support of it. The Standing Orders Committee will report the recommendation accordingly to Congress.

(3) The Standing Orders Committee shall assist Regional delegations in the drafting of composite resolutions and shall make proposals and recommendations accordingly.

In determining proposals on composite resolutions, the Committee shall bear in mind the following points:

- that the principles and proposals of the Motions concerned are covered in the composite resolution
- that the wording of the composite resolution reflects the meaning of the original Motions.

The first Report of the Committee shall, as far as possible, report on agreed composite Motions, and/or indicate those Motions which are being considered for compositing and fix the time and place at which Regional delegations are required to meet the SOC either to discuss the compositing of Motions, or any other matters relating to Motions standing in the name of a Regional delegation.

In the event of a delegation failing to respond to an invitation to meet the SOC this shall be reported to Congress with the recommendation that the Motion shall fall.

If in the opinion of the SOC a Regional delegation has unreasonably declined to composite a Motion, this shall be reported to Congress with any recommendations that the Chair of SOC deems appropriate.

If it is proposed to composite Motions on which the CEC has adopted different attitudes, the CEC Observers shall consult with the General Secretary. The Standing Orders Committee and the Delegations involved in the proposed compositing shall be informed of the CEC attitude prior to the proposed composite being finalised.

If the Regional delegation agrees to a composite resolution, agreement will then be sought between the delegations concerned on which shall move and second the resolution and, where appropriate, which Regional delegation shall have the right to speak in support of it. The Standing Orders Committee will report the recommendation accordingly to Congress.

Priority in debate will be given to those delegates who assist in achieving a composite.

4. EMERGENCY MOTIONS

Any Delegate wishing to submit an Emergency Motion shall in the first instance seek the agreement of his/her Regional delegation that the Motion is an Emergency Motion. It shall then be referred to the

Standing Orders Committee, which shall decide whether the Motion is an Emergency Motion after taking account of the following points:

- whether the Motion involves a serious situation needing quick action
- whether the Motion relates to events that have occurred after the closing date for motions as prescribed in the Rule Book
- whether the Motion relates to a decision already taken by the Congress which is in session and would consequently amend or rescind the decision.

Emergency Motions can be composited.

5. WITHDRAWAL OF MOTIONS

If a Regional delegation wishes to withdraw a Motion in the name of a branch of the Region, or in the name of the Regional Committee, the Regional Secretary shall notify the Standing Orders Committee.

6. MATTERS OF URGENCY

Any delegate wishing to bring before Congress "a matter of urgency" not on the agenda shall in the first instance seek the agreement of his/her Regional delegation that the matter is one of urgency in accordance with Rule 70. It shall then be referred to the Standing Orders Committee, which shall recommend whether or not the matter is one of urgency, after taking account of the following points:

- whether the matter needs immediate decision and is a matter which is not (whether by Motion or otherwise) already on the agenda
- whether the matter could have been dealt with adequately in an ordinary Motion placed on the Congress agenda, or by an Emergency Motion.

The Standing Orders Committee shall inform the President of Congress and Congress of its recommendation. The President shall then, in accordance with Rule 70, put the Motion that the matter be taken as a matter of urgency, and it is then the responsibility of Congress to decide whether the matter be so brought forward.

7. CENTRAL EXECUTIVE COUNCIL

The Central Executive Council has the right within rule to submit Motions to Congress. The Central Executive Council will notify Regional delegations of these Motions prior to their pre-Congress meetings.

The Central Executive Council shall have the right to submit Motions as "a matter of emergency" to Congress. The Central Executive Council should notify the Standing Orders Committee of their intention to do so.

Subject to the provisions of Rule 8, the Central Executive Council members should only speak at Congress where they are representing Central Executive Council policy. Where a Central Executive Council member is asked by his/her Regional delegation to speak to the Regional delegation's policy, he/she shall only do so provided the delegation's policy is not in contravention with Central Executive Council policy.

8. DEBATING PROCEDURE

The Procedure for debating Congress Motions shall normally be at the discretion of the President who will indicate to Congress wherever appropriate, the procedure or procedures he/she intends to adopt.

In determining the procedure for debating Motions, the President shall have regard to the following points:

- no resolution of the Congress in session can be amended, rescinded or negatived by a subsequent Motion, at that Congress;
- precedence in debates shall be given to a Motion of the Central Executive Council;
- the procedures for taking Motions are as set out in Rule 70 Clauses 3-18 in respect of Council meetings;
- rule amendments take precedence in debate over general Motions;
- personal attacks on colleagues should not take place.

The Standing Orders Committee shall advise the President what Motions will fall if another motion or a Special Report is carried.

9. TIME LIMITS FOR SPEAKERS

The times for speakers will be recommended by the Standing Orders Committee, taking account of the amount of business on the agenda.

It may be necessary, in order that the business of Congress is properly completed, that time for speakers be curtailed. The Standing Orders Committee shall recommend revised times for speakers to Congress. If, in the interests of saving Congress time, a Motion that the Central Executive Council is accepting without qualification is formally moved and seconded, there shall be no CEC speaker on the Motion.

10. VOTING

It shall be within the discretion of the President to determine the manner of voting, whether it be by a show of hands, a tellers vote or a card vote.

Only Delegates seated in the Congress Hall should vote. If, in exceptional circumstances, the President instructs that the doors to the Hall be closed, he/she should give prior warning to Delegates.

Show of Hands: The President shall call for those in favour to show, and shall then call for those against.

Teller Vote: The tellers elected for each Region shall, when the President of Congress instructs, count the hands raised In Favour. They will report this total to the General Member Auditors. The tellers then shall likewise count the hands raised Against, and similarly report the total to the General Member Auditors. The General Member Auditors shall report the result to the President.

Card Vote: A book of voting cards will be issued to each delegate. Each book will contain numbered cards marked "For", and cards marked "Against". The number on each card is to identify the number of the vote, and cannot be used to identify the individual voting. The appropriate voting card will be selected and used by the delegate to vote either "For" or "Against". The card must not be marked in any way, but placed in the ballot box provided by the teller.

When the President has decided that a card vote is necessary:

- (a) tellers will provide a ballot box for each regional delegation;
- (b) the President will announce the number of the card to be used for example: 'Card Vote number 1';

- (c) delegates will choose the appropriate numbered card, marked either "For" or "Against" from their book of voting cards and place it into the ballot box provided;
- (d) once the President has announced 'Card Vote completed' tellers will take the ballot boxes to the General Member Auditors:
- (e) the General Member Auditors will count the votes, and notify the President of the result.

President: The President of Congress shall have no vote. If there is a tied vote, then the motion shall fall.

11. VOTING FOR PRESIDENT AND VICE-PRESIDENT

The President and Vice-President of the Union shall be elected by Congress, in accordance with the provisions of Rule 12 and 13. Ballot papers bearing the names of the candidates will be issued at Congress.

12. LITERATURE

No literature or leaflets - other than official GMB literature - may be distributed inside the Congress Building without the prior permission of the Standing Orders Committee.

Literature, wherever distributed, which is intended to influence the voting intentions of delegates to Congress, should be brought to the attention of the Standing Orders Committee.

13. PREVIOUS CONGRESS DECISIONS

The following Motions, carried at previous Congresses, relate to the conduct of Congress.

1974 CONGRESS, BLACKPOOL, MOTION 257

PRE-CONGRESS DELEGATE MEETINGS

Congress agrees that in order to widen the area of debate, and to achieve a more democratic expression of Congress delegates, Pre-Congress meetings should determine their voting intentions, with regard to resolutions from within their own Region, and matters reflecting a point of principle. But should not determine an intractable attitude to resolutions from other Regions until the conclusion of the general debate.

PERIVALE BRANCH (London Region)

1985 CONGRESS, BLACKPOOL, SPECIAL MOTION

CORE RULE 34

Congress re-affirms the powers of the Central Executive Council as provided for within Rule to revise Officials' salaries and matters related to conditions of service.

CENTRAL EXECUTIVE COUNCIL

1993 CONGRESS, PORTSMOUTH, MOTION 144

CONGRESS DOCUMENTS

Congress agrees that at future Congresses, all documents provided by the Central Executive Council and any Motions with several components, shall be voted on by paragraph or section, where that year's Congress decides by a majority vote to do so. Congress can thus reject parts of documents and Motions without rejecting all that is presented.

MELTON GENERAL BRANCH (Midland & East Coast Region)

1999 CONGRESS, BLACKPOOL, MOTION 9

CONGRESS DEMOCRACY

Congress has previously resolved that Pre-Congress meetings should not determine an intractable attitude to resolutions from other regions until the conclusion of the general debate (1974 Congress).

Congress now demands the end of the practice of regions mandating delegates on any motions other than those of their own region, unless a major matter of principle is involved.

NORTH WEST LONDON BRANCH (London Region)

2003 CONGRESS, BLACKPOOL, MOTION 11

UNION DEMOCRACY

Congress calls for delegates to have democratic freedom. It would be of assistance to have voting procedures explained at start of Congress. At last Congress many delegates supported motions but voted against because they were instructed to oppose. New delegates were not aware they could have free votes.

THAMES VALLEY BRANCH (London Region)

STANDING ORDERS COMMITTEE REPORT NO. 1

The business of Congress will be conducted in accordance with the Agenda, the Programme and the Guidelines for Congress Business, subject to changes at the President's discretion.

Times for Congress

The Standing Orders Committee wishes to draw the attention of Delegates to the starting times of the morning and afternoon sessions set out in the Congress programme as follows

9.30 am – 12.30 pm, 2.00 pm – 5.30 pm

Thursday 9 June

9.30 am – 12.30 pm
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The Standing Orders Committee recommends that the President be authorised to close each session when appropriate, without further reference to the Standing Orders Committee or to Congress.

Times for Speakers

The Standing Orders Committee recommends the following Time Limits for Speakers.

General Motions and Rule Amendments:

Movers up to 4 Minutes Seconders up to 2 Minutes Other Speakers up to 2 Minutes

Officers' Reports:

General Secretary up to 10 Minutes Movers of Section Reports up to 5 Minutes Questions up to 1 Minute

Officers' and Section Reports, and questions to them, should relate only to matters of general policy, and not to details of negotiations.

Special Reports and CEC Statements:

Mover up to 6 Minutes Seconder up to 3 Minutes Other Speakers up to 3 Minutes

It would help the business of Congress enormously if, wherever possible, motions could be formally seconded, and if replies to questions and debates were kept to a minimum.

The Standing Orders Committee draws Delegates' attention to the two rostrums and asks speakers to be ready by the vacant rostrum when it is their turn to speak. Chairs will be provided at the front of the hall for speakers awaiting their turn.

Questions on Balance Sheet and Auditors' Report

Questions on the Balance Sheet and Auditors' Report must be submitted in writing to the Congress office no later than 5.30 pm on Monday 6 June 2011.

Motions Out of Order

The Standing Orders Committee has ruled that the following Motions are Out of Order for the reasons specified:

21: Regional Political Activity Yorkshire & North Derbyshire

The Motion calls for Regions to have a political officer and a minimum of 3 district political officers chosen by the Regional Secretary. This would require a consequential amendment to Rule 19 and a new Rule to establish the positions. There are no proposed Rule Amendments and the Motion is out of order for this reason.

22: Regional Political Forum Yorkshire & North Derbyshire

The Motion calls for each Region to have a political forum. This would require an amendment to Rule 19 and a new Rule to establish the forum. There are no proposed Rule Amendments and the Motion is out of order for this reason.

23: Branch Political Officers London

The Motion calls for Branch Political Labour Party Officers for each Branch. This would require an amendment to Rule 36 and a new Rule to establish the position. There are no proposed Rule Amendments and the Motion is out of order for this reason.

24: Political

Yorkshire & North Derbyshire

The Motion calls for a new rule book for branches to appoint a political officer and for all regions to adopt a political forum. There is no proposed Rule Amendment and the Motion is out of order for this reason.

26: Reserved Seat for Equality on Regional Committees Yorkshire & North Derbyshire

The Motion calls for a reserved seat for equality on Regional Committees. This would require consequential amendment to Rules 19 and 20. There are no proposed Rule Amendments and the Motion is out of order for this reason.

30: RMA Conference London

The Motion refers to the rules governing retired member visitors to RMA Conference. In accordance with the Guidelines for Congress Business, the subject matter of the Motion ought to be considered by a more appropriate body i.e. the RMA Conference.

140: A & E Support Workers London

The Motion refers to a specific element of job evaluation for ambulance service members. In accordance with the Guidelines for Congress Business the subject matter of the Motion ought to be considered by a more appropriate body i.e. the NHS National Advisory Committee.

141: A-E Support Workers Southern

The Motion refers to a specific element of job evaluation for ambulance service members. In accordance with the Guidelines for Congress Business the subject matter of the Motion ought to be considered by a more appropriate body i.e. the NHS National Advisory Committee.

143: Fair Pay for All Southern Cross Workers Yorkshire & North Derbyshire

The Motion refers to a specific element of members working for Southern Cross i.e. their pay. In accordance with the Guidelines for Congress Business the subject matter of the Motion ought to be considered by a more appropriate body i.e. the Southern Cross National Committee.

205: GMB Policy Southern

It is not clear from the wording of the Motion what it means and what it is seeking to instruct the union to do. The Motion is incomprehensible and is out of order for this reason.

Motions in line with Existing Policy

In accordance with recommendation 14 of the "Framework for the Future of GMB: Moving Forward" CEC Special Report endorsed by Congress 2007, the CEC has advised the Standing Orders Committee about those Motions which are in line with existing GMB policy. Composite Motions

Agreement has been reached on the Composite Motions printed in the Final Agenda.

Mobile Phones

If mobile phones are brought into the Congress Hall, they must be switched off at all times when Congress is in session.

Film Cameras

The Standing Orders Committee has given permission for film cameras to be used in the Conference Hall. The Committee has been assured that filming will be carried out with no interference to Delegates.

DVDs, Videos etc

Requests to play DVDs, videos, etc should be submitted to the Standing Orders Committee for approval prior to be shown at Congress.

Bucket Collections

Requests for permission to hold Bucket Collections should be submitted in writing to the Committee by 11 am on the first Sunday morning session of Congress. (It is a term of Exhibitors' agreements with GMB that they will <u>not</u> request permission to hold a collection.) Requests must be submitted in writing by the Regional Secretary, and must have the support of the Regional Delegation. Priority will be given to requests for bucket collections which concern trade union or related issues. Where permission is granted, those requesting the collection must organise, count and bank the collection, if necessary liaising with the Congress office for support from Congress Stewards. They must then notify the Congress office of the amount collected, so that the President can inform Congress.

In the normal course of events the total number of bucket collections to be authorised by the SOC will be limited to a maximum of 3, except in exceptional and unforeseen circumstances at the discretion of the President. The SOC will limit consideration of requests for bucket collections to a maximum of 1 per Region, except in exceptional and unforeseen circumstances.

By agreement reached at Congress 96, Regional Committees will each contribute a further sum to the national Congress gift. So permission will not be granted for a collection to augment the Congress gift

This Congress calls upon the CEC to investigate and confirm who the NAU are accountable to, in view of their actions after last year's Congress.

ANWICK & MID LINCS COMMUNITY BRANCH Midland & East Coast Region

7. RULE BOOK

This Congress says on the produced new Rulebook in 2008 on response to the CEC document, Congress agreed a copy and amendments would be sent to branches as there are branches who are not on email.

Congress asks why this is not happening?

EAST DEREHAM BRANCH London Region

10. BRANCH FUNDING FOR GMB YORK WORKERS CO-OPERATIVE

This Congress will recall the travesty when our Remploy members who were faced with mass factory closures by bad management and with no defence from the Labour Party. Many of our members were removed from long-standing employment into areas of the unknown. Many of these disabled workers were subject to losing their jobs through redundancies at a time when employment was flourishing.

This is against the backdrop where the management of the employer continue to reap the benefits off the back of these workers.

It is a disgrace the way that these individuals were treated, and it's thanks to support from the GMB and its Officers that alternatives for some people in York was to move to a Workers Co-Operative.

However I'm sure you will agree that this kind of Co-Operative needs to be run on strict financial rules, and should never be allowed to enter into debt for the sake of lack of funds. It's stability is down to everyone to do all it can to ensure security for the disabled workers. We have recently seen many letters requiring financial support for the York Workers Co-Operative, and we need to ensure that there is a mechanism at the National Administration Unit that should branches wish to contribute on an ongoing basis, through direct debit at source then they should be allowed, and encouraged to do so.

This motion is therefore a plea to Congress to allow this to happen, and an additional plea to branches across the Union, to set up direct debits where money can be automatically transferred to the York Workers Co-Operative to give sound financial stability for the future and benefit of these disabled workers, and have the fear of lack of funds to continue, removed.

11. RETIRED MEMBERS SECTION - NAME CHANGE

This Congress calls upon the GMB to change the name of the Retired Members Association to the 'Active Retired Members Association'. This is to recognise and reflect the important role that our retired but very active colleagues play within the GMB and the wider Trade Union Movement.

HULL NO.1 BRANCH Midland & East Coast Region

12. RMA

This Congress supports the RMA in its campaigning for a better State Pension and Social Care Provision, Congress is asked to insist that every issue of all National/Regional GMB magazines have a page dedicated to the activities of the RMA.

MILTON KEYNES CITY BRANCH London Region

13. LONG SERVICE AWARDS

This Congress seeks for an automatic Long Service award system to recognise all long service members.

Congress says by introducing this system all members within the GMB would receive this honourable award.

EAST DEREHAM BRANCH London Region

14. UPDATING MEMBERSHIP APPLICATION FORMS

This Congress calls for the updating of both paper and electronic membership application forms in order to gather essential information for the better servicing of members, particularly on equality issues, and to reemphasise the importance of personal contact details (and the need to inform the Union of changes thereto).

Valuable time is lost by both Officers and Lay Officials in the pursuit of missing basic information on members, and, with the Union's increasing focus on gender, sexuality and disability issues, there is a growing need for the sensitive gathering and application of such data if we are to respond accordingly.

Congress therefore instructs the CEC to initiate moves to redesign membership application forms which may, after appropriate consultation be introduced as soon as possible.

15. ICT AND THE 21ST CENTURY

Congress we request that the ICT of each region is to be brought fully into the 21st Century, some regions have very easy to navigate websites to use with up to date information; while some have very poor information for members that is, in places, years out of date or so confusing they are impossible to use.

We also ask that branches and more importantly branch secretaries are asked what they want or need in the design of the websites. There is so much information out there and so much that is now legally able to be sent by email which will save the GMB and branches great amounts in postage, this should be a priority especially if we want to be the forefront of unions for our members and potential new members.

16. THORNE CREDIT UNION

This Congress calls for the CEC to actively promote membership of the Thorne Credit Union to all GMB members.

All regions of the GMB should have the same access and benefits to this Credit Union, controlled and managed by GMB members.

MANSFIELD CENTRAL BRANCH

Midland & East Coast Region

17. LOCAL TUCs

This Congress is proud of the long tradition of links that the GMB and its predecessors have built up and maintained with Trades Union Councils across Britain, over more than a hundred years.

Congress:

- Recognises the unique role local TUCs have occupied, and continue to occupy, in representing our movement within our communities.
- Believes that the part they can play, and are playing, in localities in the current struggles
 against cuts in public services is distinctive and deserving of our fullest support and
 involvement.

Congress therefore:

• Calls on our General Council, Regional Committees, officials and branch officers to make a concerted effort to ensure that local branches of the GMB join their local Trades Union Councils, send delegates to meetings and pay the appropriate affiliation fees.

UNION ORGANISATION RECRUITMENT & ORGANISATION

18. AID FOR BRANCHES WITHIN THE NHS FOR RECRUITMENT

This Congress we ask for support to be given to all branches within the NHS to recruit members using the GMB@work model. As there can be many unions targeting the same workers within each trust as potential members the GMB can be at a disadvantage, as we are not often seen as the union to join for NHS workers. All help that can be given should be, especially as the NHS will be a target for recruitment.

KEIGHLEY AND AIREDALE GENERAL BRANCH Yorkshire & North Derbyshire Region

19. YOUNG MEMBERS

This Congress calls upon the CEC to encourage growth amongst young members by providing additional resources and funding to promote the GMB@Work Organising Agenda.

LEEDS SCHOOL SUPPORT STAFF BRANCH Yorkshire & North Derbyshire Region

UNION ORGANISATION REPRESENTATION & ACCOUNTABILITY

X 21. REGIONAL POLITICAL ACTIVITY

This Congress agrees that each region shall have a political officer and a minimum of 3 district political officers chosen by the regional secretary from within the region. This team will form part of the Regional Political Forum.

CIBA CHEMICALS BRANCH Yorkshire & North Derbyshire Region

X 22. REGIONAL POLITICAL FORUM

This Congress agrees that each region shall have a political forum and that this forum shall meet and develop a regional political strategy. This strategy must be agreed and approved by the Regional Committee and the regional secretary on an annual basis.

CIBA CHEMICALS BRANCH Yorkshire & North Derbyshire Region

X 23. BRANCH POLITICAL OFFICERS

This Congress wishes to develop Branch Political Labour Party Officers for each Branch. There are many reasons why we need to build a Labour Party that represents the views and policies of our members, and to achieve this will take some time. To have Branch Labour Party Officers will help to maintain and develop the political agenda with our members at branch level.

This would not involve any extra costs and would greatly assist in educating and maintaining and building good relationships between the Labour Movement and our branch members.

There may be an objection from the CEC as this may involve a Rule change. However it would be a positive move of the CEC could suggest this motion and adopt it which is within their remit.

ISLINGTON 1 & HARINGEY BRANCH London Region

X 24. POLITICAL

This Congress we call upon and the CEC to allow a new rulebook position that all branches should appoint a political officer and for all regions to adopt a political forum to integrate with MP's.

BRIGHTSIDE BRANCH Yorkshire & North Derbyshire Region

X 26. RESERVED SEAT FOR EQUALITY ON REGIONAL COMMITTEES

This Congress we call upon and the CEC to allow a reserved seat for equality on Regional Committees, this will be addition to the numbers currently on Regional Committees.

BRIGHTSIDE BRANCH Yorkshire & North Derbyshire Region

28. RMA

This Congress calls on the CEC to investigate for the RMA to be allocated a seat on the Regional Council, Regional Committee and Congress in the same manner as reserved seats within the structure of the GMB.

EAST DEREHAM BRANCH London Region

29. INVOLVEMENT OF RETIRED MEMBERS

This Congress agrees to look at how retired members can remain active within the union including possible rule changes to allow active involvement for lifetime retired members.

YORKSHIRE COAL STAFF BRANCH Yorkshire & North Derbyshire Region

X 30. RMA CONFERENCE

This Conference is called upon to revise the rules governing retired member visitors to RMA Conference not being allowed to speak.

Congress is therefore asked to approve a special dispensation being given to retired member visitors at RMA Conferences that at the discretion of the President, they be allowed to speak.

MILTON KEYNES CITY BRANCH London Region

UNION ORGANISATION FINANCE & CONTRIBUTIONS

31. BRANCH ACCOUNTING SYSTEM - RULE 35

This Congress welcomes the transparency and accountability of the new Accounting System; however we do not believe that the proposed scale of payments for Branch President and Branch Auditors reflects the time and effort that these Officers put into the Branch to ensure that the controls and checks are in place. The GMB has always prided itself (and rightly so) on working to obtain a fair wage for workers. These proposals are not fair given that these Branch Officers spend a lot of their time outside the workplace working for the good of the members of the Branch. The proposed payment for Auditors starts at below the Maximum Minimum Wage. We call on the CEC to revise and improve these scales now to reflect the value of their service to the GMB and continue to review them in line with other benefits and membership fees.

X07 BRANCH North West & Irish Region

32. BRANCH ACCOUNTING

Whilst welcoming the attempts to improve the branch accounting system, making it more transparent and robust, Congress calls on the CEC to consult with the Regions and Branches to ensure the new format is achieving what it is designed to do.

Also, to review the system, in order to reduce duplication and unnecessary paperwork, leaving the Union with a simple, robust, branch accounting system.

MIDLAND HEALTHCARE BRANCH

Midland & East Coast Region

34. BRANCH SECRETARIES TRAINING AND BRANCH ACCOUNTS (AS SHOWN IN RULE BOOK)

Congress we request training for all Branch Secretaries – training in all aspects of branch organising but more importantly on how to keep proper financial records and recording systems so the improved and more useful data can be shared between Regions and Branches. As agreed at Congress 2007 in motion 34, we are still waiting for the training.

We also ask that in future Branch secretaries will be consulted before any changes are made in the branch accounting systems as the latest system is confusing and with lack of training makes little sense to some branch secretaries; even those who are trained in accounting are having problems.

As per rule 38.3 we also ask that computerised accounting is allowed as soon as possible and that scanning and emailing of all the accounting paperwork with signature of auditors and branch officers is permitted, providing the branch keeps a copy of either the signed paperwork or computerised accounts so that we can bring the GMB into the 21st century, which also satisfies the 6 year rule of keeping accounts.

As there is no clarification as to whether this rule has meant in the past to **send** is by post or **to send** is by email then both formats will be acceptable.

38.3 states

...The branch secretary will send to the National Administration Unit the branch's balance sheet, which will should be signed by the auditors and the president, within 14 days of the end of the quarter.

What we do ask Congress though is to substitute the word should to will to ensure signatories of required branch officers on the quarterly account sheets.

B40 BOURNEMOUTH BRANCH Southern Region

UNION ORGANISATION COMMUNITIES

38. GMB INVOLVEMENT IN THE WIDER COMMUNITY

This Congress calls upon all regions of the GMB to adopt the best practice set by the Yorkshire Professional Drivers' branch in branding the GMB as the union for the Asian community.

Two years ago the region responded to a request from private hire drivers to represent them in relation to a number of issues, as well as successfully realising many of their aims, the GMB has also provided learning centres using Union Learning funding and is currently providing training for both established and newer community leaders utilising UM3 project funding.

By demonstrating a willingness to represent this section of our community and also to work together providing training and education the GMB can fill a gap that has been open for too long and bring about mutuality beneficial to both parties.

YORKSHIRE PROFESSIONAL DRIVERS' ASSOCIATION BRANCH Yorkshire & North Derbyshire Region

UNION ORGANISATION EQUALITY & INCLUSION

39. EQUALITIES

This Congress calls on the Government to reverse the disgraceful decision of Home Secretary, Theresa May, not to implement elements of the Equality Act (2010). Congress calls on the Labour Party to fully reaffirm its commitments to the Act and to confirm that the next Labour Government will implement the Equality Act (2010) in full.

NORTH CUMBRIA GENERAL BRANCH

Northern Region

40. EQUALITY STRATEGY

This Congress calls on the CEC to instruct all GMB Officers and Lay Officials to pursue the GMB Equality Strategy in any negotiations or consultations that take place in the workplace. This will assist in driving the Equality and Inclusion Agenda, highlighting it as a core strategy, not a side issue.

S02 BRANCH North West & Irish Region

41. SOCIAL

This Congress recognises that it is wholly unjust that young men are unfavourably discriminated against when insuring motor vehicles as against young women.

We instruct the CEC to campaign where appropriate to redress this inequality.

R35 ROCESTER JCB BRANCH Birmingham & West Midlands Region

42. GMB POLICY

Congress supports the promotion of legislation that makes it unlawful to discriminate on the grounds of wealth or income.

P20 PLYMOUTH BRANCH Southern Region

44. EQUAL LOVE

This Congress welcomes the campaign launched by Equal Love which looks to campaign for an end to the current segregation of relationships based on a person's sexual orientation.

- Congress believes that people in relationships irrespective of sexual orientation should be able to enter a civil marriage or a civil partnership.
- The current laws in this area provide for lesser rights and responsibilities for those people entering civil
 partnerships. These include a different circulation for when pension contributions are taken into
 account for survivor benefits.
- Congress believes that the current system of heterosexual marriage and lesbian and gay civil
 partnership is a form of sexual apartheid and should be exposed as such.

This Congress therefore agrees to support Equal Love and similar campaigns that seek to create and equal basis for recognising a relationship in the eyes of the law and to use our contacts with the Labour Party to get commitments to rectify this situation.

GMB@PCS BRANCH London Region

45. AFFILIATION TO CHARTER FOR WOMEN

This Congress notes the continued discrimination against women, in the work, in society at large, and even within the labour movement.

Congress agrees that GMB should affiliate to the Charter for Women that is now supported by 16 national trade unions, and GMB should play an active part in the campaign.

W15 WILTSHIRE & SWINDON BRANCH Southern Region

46. CHARTER FOR WOMEN

This Congress notes that the current Government's Comprehensive Spending Review will impact far more on women and especially poorer women and women pensioners than it will anyone else.

At the recent Charter for Women Conference a call went out for the trade union movement to unite in opposition to the misogynist, unjust and unfair attacks on women.

The Charter for Women is a progressive Charter of demands for women in society, at work and in the Labour Movement arrived at by Trade Union and other Labour Movement Activists. Affiliation would allow the GMB to join the other affiliates (including UNITE, UNISON, NUT, UCU, RMT, NUJ, PCS, FBU, NASUWT, SoR etc) in campaigning against the current Government's "slash and burn" manifesto.

This Congress calls on the GMB to affiliate to the Charter for Women, and to nominate a leading woman Activist to sit on the Steering Committee.

NORTH WEST LONDON BRANCH London Region

47. STOP DOMESTIC ABUSE

This Congress notes the 51,926 incidents of domestic abuse that were recorded by Scotland's police forces in 2009/10, and the fact that one in five women in Scotland experiences domestic abuse at some point during her life.

"Congress recognises that the effects of violence do not stop at the front door of the workplace, that women are stalked, harassed and assaulted by their partners at work, and domestic abuse is also a cause of absence from work.

"Congress also notes that women must rely on civil protective orders such as interdicts and non-harassment orders, to deliver them some measure of safety. Although legal aid is available to women to pay for these, a contribution to this is means-tested, and the pressures on the family budgets of low-paid working women experiencing abuse, are such that they are often unable to do so.

"Congress believes that trade unions, and workplace organisers, have a critical role in responding to domestic abuse, both in campaigning for adequately resourced prevention, protection and provision for women, and in negotiating workplace policies that ensure employers and reps respond appropriately to workers who have been abused.

"Congress calls on the General Council to:

- encourage the Scottish Government and Cosla to put in place a sustainable funding solution for frontline services;
- campaign against cuts to the Legal Aid budget that will limit low-paid women's access to civil protective orders; and
- engage with the Scottish Women's Aid 'STOP' Campaign, which will roll out prevention work to workplaces, places of education and community groups."

TOLLCROSS BISCUITS BRANCH GMB Scotland

48. RETIREMENT AGE

This Congress welcomes the abolition of the Default Retirement Age and recognises that choice is preferable to compulsion when it comes to an individual's time to finish working.

However, it is the case that some employers will still seek to impose a compulsory retirement age and Congress calls upon GMB negotiators at all levels, to achieve policy outcomes which allow members to remain economically active.

TORFAEN BRANCH South Western Region

49. AGE DISCRIMINATION

Congress, following the recent high profile case of Miriam O'Reilly wherein she, and John Craven were referred to as being "hardly spring chickens" by a member of senior management within the BBC, and where Ms O'Reilly was also told "to be careful about those wrinkles", this Congress calls for the age discrimination legislation to be strengthened and more vigorously enforced, given the contribution and experience that "older" workers bring to the UK's workplaces. That the GMB campaigns against "ageism" in the workplace, by raising awareness of the issue with politicians, employers, the media and opinion-formers, given that the population is living longer and will be expected to work for more years beyond the current "normal" retirement age of 65. We would remind employers that workers do not need to be youthful and attractive to fulfil their contractual obligations. Age brings with it a wealth of knowledge and experience which should be viewed as an asset not a liability.

GMB UNITE BRANCH London Region

50. SEXUAL HARASSMENT

This Congress will be aware of the media attention, in January 2011, relating to the football lines woman and the comments made about her ability to carry out her role.

What this has highlighted is the way in which sexual harassment is perceived by both men and women and Congress agrees to endorse the seriousness of issues in this area.

BRISTOL PUBLIC SERVICES BRANCH
South Western Region

EMPLOYMENT POLICY HEALTH, SAFETY & ENVIRONMENT

©1 51. H&S AT WORK CUTS

This Congress is aware that the focus of the Tory led government's attack on working people is on wages, services and benefits. It should not be forgotten that cuts to both central and local government will result in fewer workplace inspections and reduced prosecutions. Congress pledges the GMB to lead the campaign that ensures workplaces become safer and not more dangerous during this Parliament.

CAMBRIDGE 2 BRANCH London Region

©1 52. EMPLOYMENT AND HEALTH AND SAFETY REGULATIONS

This Congress seeks a campaign to retain, and the prevention on the proposal to deregulation of the existing Employment and Health and Safety Regulations.

EAST DEREHAM BRANCH London Region

53. HEALTH & SAFETY

This Congress calls on the Government to offer incentives to complement law enforcement in occupational health and safety, rewarding organisations for having safe and healthy workplaces.

NOTTINGHAM TEC BRANCH Midland & East Coast Region

54. ROVING SAFETY REPS

This Congress already recognises that the premium derived from having recognised Safety Representatives is improving health and safety in many GMB workplaces. GMB also has an existing policy in supporting roving Safety Representatives.

However in the current climate following the Lord Young Review, and the cuts to both the Inspectors in the HSE and Local Authorities this Congress calls for the CEC to lead a campaign to raise the profile of Safety Reps in the workplace and to reiterate our collective policy of advocating roving Safety Reps.

GMB Safety Reps are often better informed than many of their Managers on Health and Safety issues.

Congress proposes that the campaign is initiated in the water and other utility industries which have the resources to facilitate roving Safety Reps where every day our members encounter contractors with variable safety procedures and where there exists the geographical distances to make their presence in those industries productive and viable.

THAMES GENERAL BRANCH London Region

EP 56. ASBESTOS

This Congress condemns the unreasonable and unjust Government decision to deny compensation to widows of pleural plaques victims, who had waited years to receive £5,000 in compensation but, who sadly died before the funds were eventually released. Congress believes that these widows played a very important role in sustaining their partners through the overlong struggle for compensation rights. Congress urges the Government to seek ways to recognise the plight of these widows and to allow the payment to accrue to their next of kin.

STOCKTON NO 3 ENGINEERING BRANCH
Northern Region

57. ASBESTOS

This Congress is concerned that the implications of the decision by the Court of Appeal on the 8th October 2010 will be that many victims of asbestos-related disease will die without the certainty that their families will be entitled to compensation. Congress agrees that it is the exposure to asbestos that can lead to the development of fatal diseases such as mesothelioma and that the trigger must, therefore, be the point of exposure and not, as challenged by the insurance industry, the point the disease develops, which can be many decades later. Congress further agrees with the High Court ruing in 2008 that the insurers who should pay compensation are those who provided cover to the employer at the time of the asbestos exposure and we note that this is the latest of many attacks by the insurance industry on compensation for working people who were negligently exposes to deadly asbestos. Congress calls on the Association of British Insurers to take action against any of its members who are challenging the established trigger that is the point of exposure and support the establishment of an Employers' Liability Insurance Bureau.

NORTH TYNE MANUFACTURING BRANCH
Northern Region

58. BULLYING IN THE WORKPLACE

This Congress whilst being at the forefront in the fight against bullying in the workplace, notes it is now also prevalent in the public service as well as the private sector.

We call upon Congress to make the issue of bullying a priority and adopt a hard line approach and attack the bullying at source.

The source is the Company Director, Line Management and Human Resources.

In many workplaces, taking out a grievance against a bullying management is like signing your own dismissal notice.

Also the employee's work life balance is affected owing to the knowledge they will have to go back into the same working environment on a daily basis.

SOUTHEND ON SEA BRANCH London Region

59. WORK RELATED MENTAL ILLNESS

This Congress views with concern the increased levels of mental illness amongst the UK's workers. Work related psychiatric illness has become a hugely serious chronic problem affecting our members.

Congress instructs the CEC to campaign on behalf of GMB members for better awareness and safeguards in the workplace.

MANSFIELD CENTRAL BRANCH

Midland & East Coast Region

60. MEDICAL FIT NOTE

This Congress believes the implementation of the 'Fit Note' enabling some of our members to return to work on 'light duties' appears to be ignored by some managers who then try and dismiss our members on the grounds of incapability. At a regional level there is an increase in the number of employers targeting employees off on long term sickness, to dismiss rather than consider reasonable adjustments either, on a short or long term basis. Congress is of the view that this is as a direct link to the budget cuts and employers looking at ways of cutting redundancy costs.

Congress believes this information should be collated on a national level to name and shame those employers who are dismissing staff in this manner.

MID GLAMORGAN C&T BRANCH

South Western Region

61. COMPULSORY TRAFFIC LIGHT FOOD LABELLING

This Congress is concerned about the high levels of fat, sugar and salt that continue to be used by the food processing industry, and of the resultant increases in dietary related disease and rising levels of obesity. Congress calls on the European Parliament to make front of pack traffic light signpost labelling compulsory on all processed food packaging.

Studies show that consumers find the current food labelling systems confusing, and favours the introduction of standardised labelling to assist them in choosing foods that are of the healthier options.

Congress calls on the European Parliament and UK Government to reject intense lobbying from the food industry and to accept that the current voluntary code of practice is failing to protect the health of consumers and is putting avoidable burdens on scarce NHS resources.

HULL FOOD & GENERAL BRANCH Midland & East Coast Region

62. FREE CANCER SCREENING FOR ALL

This Congress calls for this Government to make available free cancer screening for all. The GMB calls on this Government to make funding available for a programme to be put in place for early detection on all cancers.

STOCKTON NO 3 ENGINEERING BRANCH
Northern Region

63. ENVIRONMENT

This Congress calls upon the CEC to set up a working party with a view to make better use of green technology, this will reduce the Union's impact on the environment by significantly reducing its carbon footprint.

Plans for improvements should be submitted to all GMB regions by the end of 2012. Improvements should be measurable, audited and published annually.

©2 64. PROGRESS IN RECYCLING

This Congress recognises the progress made in the recycling of re-usable materials in recent years, but now further understands that it is the time to evolve from simple avoidance of the landfill tax to the effective use of these valuable materials.

©2 65. WASTE RECYCLING

This Congress calls for a much greater focus on waste recycling within the business community, so that raw materials are not wasted, that businesses realise their corporate social responsibilities, that the green economy is enhanced and that new manufacturing jobs are created within the UK.

SOUTH SHIELDS NO 2 BRANCH Northern Region

©2 66. PLASTIC WASTE RECYCLING

This Congress calls on the Government to enable the creation of more waste recycling facilities within the UK for recycling plastics. Congress believes it to be a scandal that in large parts of the UK it is cheaper for councils and businesses to send plastic recyclates to Germany and China, to be made into recyclable commodities, than adopt more plastic recycling facilities within the UK. Congress believes that this policy would increase business demand, enable more plastic recycling and give a much needed boost to skills and employment.

SOUTH SHIELDS NO 2 BRANCH
Northern Region

67. COASTAL AREAS

This Congress calls on the Government to ensure that all coastal areas of the UK are equipped with the necessary flood and coastal protection mechanisms to guard against erosion and other devastating aspects of climate change in the UK.

SELLAFIELD INDUSTRIAL BRANCH
Northern Region

EMPLOYMENT POLICY PENSIONS & RETIREMENT

69. PENSIONS

This Congress calls for a reversal of pensions' policy, whereby workers increasingly are not able to access company pension schemes. Congress finds it scandalous that pension schemes have become a rarity within workplaces over the last thirty years. Congress calls on the Coalition Government to implement a new Pensions Act that makes it mandatory for companies to have a company pension scheme and provide workers with the opportunity to save for their retirement. Congress, also, calls for a Pensions Act to enshrine in law that it is a criminal offence punishable accordingly for owners and directors to utilise pension fund assets as part of their bottom line in mergers and take-overs.

73. PENSIONS

This Congress calls for a campaign to put pressure on the Government to stop pensions, occupational and state, from being taxed.

Congress is concerned that the Conservative Party's own research showed that in February 2009 "Pensions inflation" was as high as 8.6% for single pensioners and 6.7% for couples while the RPI was 0.1%.

The Government are proposing to amend the measure of occupational schemes from the higher rate of RPI to the lower CPI rate.

Congress acknowledges that this change will further reduce the value of occupational pensions.

Congress believes that the economic downturn combined with the Con-Dem Government's vicious cuts will disproportionately affect pensioners, and condemns this Government in failing to protect some of the most vulnerable in society.

This Congress deplores the changes to State Pensions announced by the Conservative led Government, in particular the approximate 30,000 women who will be forced to work for two years longer than they had previously planned because of the increases to the State Pensions age entitlement.

Women born between 5th March and 5th April 1954 would have been due to start drawing their State Pension when they reached 64, but the Government has moved the goal posts and this group of women will have to wait until they are 66. A total of 5.1 million people will be affected by the plans to increase the State Pension age to 66 between 2018 and 2020, but this particular group will face the longest wait of two years. The Government Pensions Minister has defended this change stating that this only represents one per cent of the 2.6 million women who will be affected by these changes.

Congress calls upon the CEC to lobby against these changes, once again women are being penalised, many in this particular group may not have another pension to retire on and having planned their retirement age, will now have to rethink their plans with only seven years to prepare.

90. THE RIGHT TO STRIKE

This Congress must maintain the workers human right to take strike action.

In recent months we have seen employers challenging legitimate industrial action in the courts preventing workers from taking action to defend safety, jobs and employment conditions. The courts have then ruled out the action on minor technicalities.

We are concerned that this type of litigation by employers is undermining the already limited rights of workers to take action in the UK.

With the ConDems in power, who are no friends of working people, they are looking to strangle our fundamental right to take strike action.

Congress is reminded that at EU level, the right to strike is enshrined in Article 28 of the Charter of Fundamental Rights of the European Union this is entitled 'Right of collective bargaining and action'.

Workers and employers, or their respective organisations, have, in accordance with Union law and national laws and practices, the right to negotiate and conclude collective agreements at the appropriate levels and, in cases of conflicts of interest, to take collective action to defend their interests, including strike action.

To maintain our rights we must take whatever action is required, we can not allow our rights to be taken away by this Government.

91. SECTION 127: RIGHT TO STRIKE

This Congress calls on the CEC to mount a campaign to abolish Section 127, which prohibits certain workers in the Security Industry from taking industrial action.

Congress believes the right to take strike action is a fundamental human right of all workers and the existence of Section 127 severely limits our bargaining power with the employer and causes disillusionment amongst our members.

This practice has for too long allowed the site owner the privilege of dismissing in true Victorian fashion, anyone whose face does not fit, because there is no recourse to Tribunal if you have not been sacked by your employer, but by your employer's client.

Contract employment of permanent employees takes away the dignity in a working life and culture which belongs as a practice in the 19th, prospered in the 20th, but has no place in the humanity of the 21st century.

EP 93. AGENCY LABOUR

Both parties in this Coalition have back tracked and broken their promise.

Congress therefore calls for this union to put pressure on the Government for the reinstatement of the Future Jobs funding to bring hope back to 16-24 year olds not in employment or training.

104. ASDA STORES

The last 3 years have seen substantial difficulties being faced by this membership despite the Union's efforts to prioritise this group as a National recruitment target.

Congress also recognises recent changes in National responsibilities both within the GMB and Asda and hopes it heralds a more positive working arrangement.

To that end Congress calls on the National Officer to establish a structure including Senior Stewards and Officers to commence joint working/training with Regional Managers in order to create a positive industrial relations working practice.

105. INVESTMENT IN THE GAS INDUSTRY

This Congress calls on the British Government to invest in the infrastructure of the Gas Industry to maintain standards of service and safety. Our pensions and conditions depend on the high quality of service we provide to our consumers and this can only be retained with investment.

©7 108. HACKNEY CARRIAGE, UNEMPLOYMENT AND LICENSING

This Congress notes that owing to the unemployment caused by the bankers casino activities, exacerbated by the wrong headed policy of draconian cutbacks by the ConDem government, tens if not hundreds of thousands are flooding into the Hackney Carriage and Private Hire Industry on a national basis.

Owing to fundamentally weak and flawed regulations within the industry brought about by free market ideology, the ease with which people can obtain a licence means:-

- There are increasing numbers in the industry who cannot undertake basic communication, calculating
 and driving duties. Topographical testing and communication skill levels are frequently appalling.
 Councils have little or no concern for the viability of this extremely important aspect of the public
 transport infrastructure.
- 2. Members of the travelling public and drivers are coming under increasing health and safety risks, many drivers work 80 plus hours a week and are in a continuous state of tiredness. Vast numbers of these drivers gave contracts to transport the young, elderly and infirm, naturally their tiredness presents an appalling risk to other road users.
- 3. Professional drivers who can do the job properly are being driven out of the industry, repossession and bankruptcy are rife. Drivers in some parts of Essex have resorted to living in caravans and one driver to our knowledge lives in his vehicle. Tory dogma on market forces is creating a situation of grave danger to the public and is literally life destroying for those working in it.

Congress therefore instructs the National Union to highlight these issues publicly and to raise the issue in the Labour Party with the objective of developing a policy that can eliminate these dangers once a Labour Government is returned to office.

PROFESSIONAL DRIVERS BRANCH London Region

109. HACKNEY CARRIAGE AND PRIVATE HIRE INDUSTRY

This Congress recognises the ridiculousness of the current legislation for Hackney Carriage and the Private Hire Industry.

Congress instructs that other Unions involved in these industries should be approached with the intention of setting up a joint working party to formulate legislation suitable for the 21st Century.

©7 110. EMERGENCY CALLS HACKNEY CARRIAGES

This Congress demands a full public enquiry into the misbehaviour of the police nationwide in continuously declining to attend emergency calls by Hackney Carriage and Private Hire Drivers. 13 have been murdered on the job in the last 15 months, drink and drink fuelled scum obviously worry not about being apprehended.

Clearly drivers safety matters little to the police but they always manage to turn out in force to attack demonstrators, sometimes resulting in demonstator's deaths. Surely a situation needing the most stringent investigation.

112. COMPETITION RULES - FERRY INDUSTRY

Congress instructs the General Secretary, in conjunction with our political department, Brussels office, MP's % MEP's, to lobby for change to UK and European competition rules. Congress notes the lack of democratic process and the existence of highly paid bureaucrats, legislating on demanding competition rules, while enjoying relative 'cosy existence'. Current demanding competition rules, in many industries, lead to such severe competition, that it is impossible for companies to return profits sufficient for a sustainable on-going business. Congress notes that this is particularly significant in the Ferry Industry, where capital investment cost is very high and good revenue streams must exist to justify and support such investment outlay. Competition rules must be relaxed to allow re-organisation and rationalisation to allow the development of sustainable businesses. In regard to competition within the Ferry industry, a much wider approach must be taken to recognise the full extent of all forms of competition and the dynamic of the industry. Congress further wishes to see a review of Marco Polo and Highways of the Seas policies, providing, for example, subsidy to new 'start up' business, which allows new entrants, that can cause serious issues for established business, already struggling with over capacity and ever higher fuel cost. Congress wishes to see a stricter enforcement of rules relating to unfair competition in the UK and Europe. Congress is concerned by the dominant influence of the Channel Tunnel/Eurotunnel, while being a technically bankrupt business and is also concerned by the continuing subsidies being paid to Seafrance while in administration. Congress recognises the vital importance of a successful Ferry industry as a trade artery and safe mover of people and goods. Congress wishes the GMB leadership to campaign on behalf of the Ferry Industry, especially in view of the high cost of building and maintaining ships and the ever increasing fuel cost.

113. NORTHERN IRELAND WATER CRISIS

This Congress calls upon the Northern Ireland Assembly to bring Northern Ireland Water back into full public ownership.

Congress is appalled over Northern Ireland Water's shambolic handling of the water crisis which resulted in 45,000 homes and business being without water in Belfast and surrounding towns after pipes burst during the freezing weather and subsequent thaw before Christmas.

Congress notes that Trench (UK) produces state of the art high voltage electrical products called Bushings, is the only remaining manufacturer of Bushings in the UK which are fundamental to the supply of electricity in the UK through the National Grid network; acknowledges that Trench (UK) are a world leader in this field and this expertise will be lost from the UK by its closure and calls on Siemens PLC to reconsider this decision.

133. STAFF HEALTH AND WELFARE

This Congress is deplores the fact that many Councils have announced massive job cuts in line with swinging budget cuts but state these cuts can be achieved by 'efficiencies' and 'smarter' ways of working. In all of this what is missing is where these cuts are being made and that whilst teams are facing drastic reduction in staffing levels the work is still expected to be delivered with significantly less staff

Many of our members are now facing stress related illnesses, depression and anxiety. Mental health is now one of the key reasons for sickness experienced by many Council workers, yet there is still a stigma associated with workers suffering from mental health issues.

Congress calls upon the CEC to consider undertaking a survey into the level of mental health illness experienced by Council staff.

134. LOCAL GOVERNMENT REDUNDANCY NOTICES SECTION 188

Congress agrees to campaign to change the legislation which allows employers in Local Government to select employees for redundancy by manipulating the laws on consultation within section 188 of the Employment Rights Act.

Many of our members in Local Government will face the traumatic situations of having to face redundancies due to the Coalition's savage cuts to public services.

Many Local Authorities have announced redundancies in excess of 100 employees, yet they fragment these maths redundancies into small bite sized chunks so as to avoid the legislation on consultation rights.

Where it is the law that where there are proposed redundancies of more than 100 employees in those employees are entitled to notice of three months. By breaking this down to smaller sections as printed in Section 188 Notice is a method that can only be described as avoiding formal consultation rights to those members faced with redundancy.

All we are asking is that these loopholes close and employers abide by the letter of the law. Should they be found not to do so then the law must be there to protect individual workers in Local Government from being treated unfairly and thrown onto the unemployment scrapheap.

EP 135. SECTION 188 NOTICES

This Congress denounces the actions of those Local Authorities who issue Section 188 Consultation Notices simply to force through inferior terms and conditions of employment. Congress calls upon the Union to continue to expose this practice and to place pressure at both a national and local level against those Councils who seek to exploit our members in this way.

It is nationally accepted that teachers can volunteer but do not legally take on this duty.

It should be the same for our members in schools and we should make sure that we have rigorous policies re: risk assessments and full training in place for staff who volunteer to take on this duty.

Please find figures for A-E Support vehicles for October – November 2009, and figures for October – November 2010 LAS it clearly shows continuous emergency workload which A-E Support at their current status should not be carrying out. Currently the A-E Support figures are October – November 2010 are 897 Red Calls – 2119 Amber Calls – 1344 Green Calls. This must not be allowed to carry on, it could possibly put lives at risk.

X 143. FAIR PAY FOR ALL SOUTHERN CROSS WORKERS

- Carer and non-carer staff on non-Southern Cross contracts.

According to Patrick Williamson (HR Director), "financial challenges mean that Southern Cross need to focus on areas that will provide the most benefit."

Clearly, Southern Cross do not consider all its staff, such as kitchen staff and cleaners, as being of benefit.

Congress calls on the GMB to support all our members at Southern Cross and to relentlessly campaign to improve the terms and wages of all Southern Cross staff.

All our members provide a valuable service. All our members deserve our support.

144. EXPLOITATION OF FOREIGN CARE WORKERS AND THE GANGMASTERS LICENSING AUTHORITY (GLA)

In an endeavour to lower their costs and reduce the pay of their care staff, the care sector continues to recruit staff from overseas particularly from Eastern Europe and South East Asia. A recent BBC Face the Facts programme estimated that over 10,000 foreign migrant workers are employed in the UK care sector.

Most of these are recruited through agencies who exploit these workers, by making them pay for the recruitment service. The BBC found in one case a worker had been charged £8000 for her fare to the UK and her employment place. Although the care homes pay the agency at least the minimum wage for the workers, these agencies frequently deduct accommodation and travelling charges from the pay before the pay is passed on to the worker. In one case accommodation amounted to a camp bed in communal room with a kettle and microwave oven.

This Congress supported the last Labour Government's effort to reduce exploitation of foreign workers in the food, agriculture and the farming sector of UK industry by introducing the Gangmaster Licensing

Authority which has now been able to regulate these sectors. We also note that Oxfam and others are campaigning to have the Gangmaster Licensing Authority take over responsibility for employment of foreign workers in the care sector.

We also note that the Gangmaster Licensing Authority has expressed a willingness to do this. During the last parliament the Liberal Democrat MP Ed Davey supported this action. Yet now as the Coalition Government's Employment Minister responsible, he now says "this would be additional and unnecessary regulation". Even though a recent report by his department BIS and the National Audit Office on better regulation found that "The GLA's impact in improving working conditions for some vulnerable workers has been impressive, particularly in view of its relatively small size".

This exploitation of foreign workers is both morally wrong and illegal, it also has the effect of suppressing the pay of other workers in the sector. Therefore this Congress believes that the GMB should support Oxfam in their campaign to transfer responsibility of employment in the Care Sector to the Gangmaster Licensing Authority.

EP 145. PRIVATE FINANCE INITIATIVE (PFI)

This Congress calls for an end to the Private Finance Initiative (PFI) as a means of trying to fund large-scale, publicly-driven capital projects. Congress believes that the PFI regime was a means of using creative accounting to fund such projects and, in the light of the worst crisis to hit capitalism in a century, Congress finds that it is simply unacceptable to use public money to line the pockets of speculators and equity funds at the detriment of the taxpayer.

THE ECONOMY 1. THE BANKING SYSTEM

146. BANKS, BONUSES AND THE ECONOMY

This Congress notes:

- 1. Two of the US banks with a significant presence in the UK announced they would be paying bonuses to their staff of over \$30 billion for 2010.
- 2. UK banks are estimated to be making £7 billion in bonus payments for 2010 when they are only paying £5.7bn in corporation tax for the same period.
- 3. That the previous Labour government and current Conservative-led government prioritised saving the Financial Industry at any price including by printing money (quantitative easing) and buying bonds from the banks.
- 4. That UK banks have been able to reduce their tax bill by writing off losses that they made in 2007, 2008 and 2009 when they were bailed out by us.
- 5. That bonuses for one year can equate to amounts that someone on average wage would take 20 years to earn.
- 6. That these bonuses have until very recently often attracted no tax and the banks avoided paying national insurance on them. This is because they were widely paid in shares, insurance policies or gold bullion that could be exchanged a few weeks later for the cash equivalent with no tax and national insurance liable.
- 7. That whilst these practices are under closer scrutiny after the financial crash and bailouts, banks are now trying to get round a lot of the regulation by increasing salaries and making deferred payment in shares that will only attract capital gains tax on any increase in the shares value.

This Congress believes:

- 8. That the waves of financial deregulation in the 1980s and 1990s broke down the barriers between Investment banking, retail and corporate banking. These barriers that had been erected after the 1929 Wall Street crash and 1930s depression to avoid a repeat of those events. The architects of this new banking system were the Wall Street and City of London bankers support by politicians from all parties.
- 9. That an industry that by has lost billions since the financial crisis broke, that has been bailed out by government should not be allowed to pay these ridiculous sums of money for what is a socially useless function that has caused and will, at some point in the future, again cause massive damage to society.
- 10. These banks would not be around today if it was not for the austerity measures that we are being asked to accept.
- 11. That instead of bailouts to banks the money should have gone into the real economy through loans to individuals, small businesses or corporations. Instead it is being harboured by the banks to prop up their ailing businesses or being used for speculation on the financial markets.
- 12. That the existing banking system is a parasite on social production. Each day the currency markets turn over \$4 trillion of transactions in assets of which 60% are held by us through our pension and insurance funds. Bankers become very rich personally through our collective wealth.
- 13. That there is no wealth creation in what they do. Any loss must be borne somewhere and these are mainly borne by us through our pension and insurance funds. This is the money that we have paid in from the salaries and wages which we have received from creating real wealth and providing valuable social services. In other words what is going on is the biggest theft in world history.

This Congress resolves:

- 14. To continue to campaign for an increased level of tax on earnings above £150,000.00.
- 15. To campaign for a reversal of the cuts in corporation tax proposed by the Conservative-led government.
- 16. To campaign for banks to pay a far higher level of taxation on their profits.
- 17. To campaign for the Robin Hood Tax on financial transactions and ask all GMB sponsored MPs to support any bill seeking to make this proposal law.
- 18. To call for a different kind of banking system. One that is under common ownership and control and that pays sensible salaries.
- 19. To call for bonuses to be paid based on criteria for the social value of the lending not short term profit.

152. COMPANIES AND GOVERNANCE ACT

This Congress calls on the Coalition Government to bring in a new Companies and Governance Act to reflect the growing need across all sectors of the economy for regulation to establish basic principles of running organisations. Congress believes that such an Act of Parliament would provide organisations with the legislative framework to cover important areas of governance, such as Director and Senior Executive pay and avoid the scandal of greedy bosses lining their own pockets at the expense of their workforce.

THE ECONOMY 2. TAXATION AND FINANCIAL REGULATION

154. TAX AVOIDANCE

This Congress notes:

- 1) There is significant cost to the UK economy of due to tax avoidance by corporations. The TUC estimated that £12bn is lost from the UK economy by the top 700 corporations.
- 2) A prime example is Vodafone. It became the focus for campaigners after it was reported that the company negotiated its way out of paying a £6bn tax bill, instead paying a lump sum of £800,000 and £450, 000 over the next five years. The tax was due after it was ruled that Vodafone's use of a subsidiary company, based in Luxembourg where profits were taxed at 1%, broke tax avoidance rules. It is probably a convenient coincidence that Vodafone's member of staff responsible for tax, John Conners, used to work for HMRC.
- 3) Vodafone is not alone: other high street names such as Arcadia Group (Burtons/Dorothy Perkins/TopShop/BhS), Barclays, Boots, HMV and corporations such as KPMG and Google have all been reported as tax avoiders.

This Congress also notes:

- 1) The TUC estimated that £8bn is lost to public funds from tax planning by the richest in society, i.e. those earning over £100k per annum. There is also significant cost to the UK economy due to tax avoidance by individuals.
- 2) Tax avoidance by wealthy people coming to live in the UK is possible due to the domicile rule. Someone moving to the UK can avoid tax for seven years on income except that which comes from the UK. After seven years they can avoid tax on their worldwide income by paying a one-off annual fee of £30,000. The domicile rule results in £3bn being lost from government revenue each year.
- 3) Sir Philip Green, boss of the Arcadia Group, is reported to funnel all profits from his businesses in his wife's name. Since she lives in Monaco, a tax haven, these profits avoid being taxed by HMRC.

This Congress believes:

- 1) There is growing public anger about the losses to the economy by these tax avoidances. This has been seen by campaigns such as UK Uncut, which has targeted Vodafone and the Arcadia group in their protests. The anti-cuts website www.falseeconomy.org.uk also highlights the problem.
- 2) That for Phillip Green whose business empire has profited from tax avoidance to be advising the government on 'efficiency savings' must stick in the throat of everyone suffering the effects of the recession and government cuts.
- 3) Collecting tax which would otherwise go to boost the profits of companies or line the pockets of the super-rich should be a priority for the government. If revenue were increased in this way if would be an alternative to the cuts in public sector spending we are currently seeing and suffering the consequences.
- 4) That for the government to neglect to take action on this issue is a dereliction of duty. We can only assume that the Con-Dems are choosing not to take action on this issue to protect the rich and powerful.

This Congress resolves:

- 1) Mandate GMB political officers to work to secure visible support from GMB sponsored Labour MPs to not only raise the issue in Parliament but bring this scandal to an end.
- 2) To call on the government to invest in HMRC to tackle this problem both for corporations and wealthy individuals
- 3) That the GMB support protests, demonstrations and campaigns which highlight this issue, such as those recently orchestrated by UK Uncut.
- 4) To publicly make the arguments that public services and people's jobs are not a drain on society, that tax avoidance is.

159. CORPORATION TAX

This Congress believes that tax is a key weapon in the fight against poverty. Taxes paid by companies and individuals enable Governments to fund vital public services such as health care, education, clean water and electricity and to finance anti-poverty programmes throughout the world. So when the multinational corporations fail to pay the tax they owe, it's the poor who pick up the bill. Yet companies now see tax dodging as a legitimate part of their business operations and the cost to society is enormous.

Developing countries lose an estimated £250 billion every year as a direct result of corporate tax dodging – money which could be used to reach the UN's Millennium Development Goals several times over.

Tax avoidance and capital flight cost Africa five times what it receives in aid in each year.

And it's not just developing countries that lose out. Britain also loses an estimated £100 billion a year through tax dodging. That's enough to double funding for the NHS. Alternatively, the same sum could cover the full state pension, eradicate student fees and enable Britain to reach the UN aid target of 0.7% of gross national income overnight.

One popular way of dodging tax is to register companies in tax havens, locales that allow companies to get away with paying minimal tax, if any. Tax havens also place little or no reporting requirements on companies, allowing them to keep secret the true sums they should be paying in tax. This then denies vital revenue to the countries in which those companies have made their profits.

Another favourite method is trade mispricing, including through the mechanism of transfer pricing. Transfer pricing involves selling items between different parts of a multinational company and deliberately mispricing the sales so as to shift the company's tax obligations to countries where it will pay less. In this way companies have 'charged' themselves over £4,000 for a ballpoint pen and under £1 for an entire prefabricated building in order to dodge the tax they owe. Transfer pricing abuse costs developing countries around £100 billion a year – twice what they receive in aid.

The UK plays a major role in helping companies dodge the tax they owe. Many of the world's tax havens are British, whether overseas territories such as the Cayman Islands, Bermuda and British Virgin Islands or Crown Dependencies such as Jersey, Guernsey and the Isle of Man.

The City of London acts as the nerve centre for these tax havens and support an army of pinstriped Lawyers and Accountants devoted to helping companies dodge tax. But as these individuals rack up ever greater profits for their companies (and cash in their own Christmas bonuses) it is the poor who are left to pay the price.

We believe it is time to put an end to this corporate tax scandal and justice, like charity, begins at home. The UK is a major part of the global problem of corporate tax dodging. We believe it should be part of the solution.

Congress therefore instructs the CEC to take this matter up with all our political, Trade Union and social contacts to seek a fairer and a more just tax system as soon as possible and make a report to the 2012 GMB Congress on progress.

160. TAX HAVENS PUT UNDER BANK OF ENGLAND CONTROL

This Congress notes that many of the tax havens around the world are former colonies or dependencies of the UK. They use the English language and the English legal system to their advantage but are not subject to British bank regulations. Congress calls upon the GMB to use its political influence to campaign for these tax havens to come under the jurisdiction of the Bank of England.

THE ECONOMY 3. PUBLIC SPENDING - FIGHT THE CUTS

162. OPPOSING THE GOVERNMENT'S ATTACK ON THE PUBLIC SECTOR – ALTERNATIVES TO CUTTING THE DEFICIT.

This Congress notes that the Con-Dem Government says that massive cuts in jobs, public services, pay and pensions cannot be avoided – there is no alternative to tackling the public sector deficit.

We disagree and so do many experts. We don't deny the deficit it was an inevitable result of the worldwide recession. The UK is in debt because the banking sector collapsed in 2008 sparking a recession. Bailing out British banks cost £1.3trillion, and the recession hit tax revenues and increased unemployment. People working to provide public services did not cause this crisis and we should not have to pay for it.

There are alternatives. Each year £70billion is lost to the economy through tax evasion and a further £25billion through avoidance. Much of this could be recovered if HM Revenue and Customs employed more staff and the legal loopholes were closed. But the Government is cutting the number of tax staff every year.

By just collecting tax that is rightfully ours, including that owed by the wealthy and big business, we could avoid public service cuts. The proposed Robin Hood Tax on financial speculation could also raise \$400billion globally.

There is another factor that Ministers ignore: the amount of tax they collect depends on how strong the economy is. If the economy does well, then that automatically helps close the deficit. If companies become more successful and more people are in work then they pay more tax.

That's why we say the cuts are a false economy. Our economic problems run deep, and experts argue about them in ways that most people do not understand. But the basic issues at stake are not that difficult – and we do have choices about what to do.

These deep and rapid cuts are not only damaging and unfair, but unnecessary. Over 100,000 Council workers had received redundancy notices by early this year – the figure is set to rise much higher. Home Care Helps, Social Workers, Teachers and Refuse Collectors are all desperately worried about their future. The same goes for staff in the NHS and Central Government.

We therefore instruct the CEC to make it a priority over the next 12 months to campaign for:

- Policies that will get the unemployed into work (and we don't mean cutting their benefits).
- A Robin Hood Tax on financial transactions
- Tax justice to include a crack-down on tax avoidance and evasion.
- The retention of public sector jobs and that public services remain public.

163. PUBLIC SERVICES AS KEY TO ECONOMIC RECOVERY

This Congress rejects outright this Government's ideological pursuit of their attacks on Public Services in the belief that this is an effective or legitimate means to achieve economic recovery.

Congress fully understands that our economic recovery is linked to strong and vibrant Public Services.

GMB Scotland supports the position that the principle of Public Services being delivered publicly is the only sustainable model which will benefit civic society.

This Congress rejects this Government's position that our economic recovery must be based on Public Sector jobs being lost, pay and pensions being reduced as the only means of addressing the deficit and achieving economic recovery in the UK.

Congress is therefore calling on the UK Government to completely review and reform the tax system ensuring fairness and not favour to their business friends.

These reforms to include:

- An end to the current tax relief to higher earners and the introduction of 50% tax rate on earners over £100,000.
- That rather than reducing those employed in tax collection there needs to be more effort in recovering uncollected tax thereby reducing our deficit.
- The introduction of a Robin Hood Tax.

Congress therefore calls on every effort to campaign for these changes.

This is another case of a total lack of concern that the contraction and in many cases the removal of this high quality service of early years support could have a lasting impact on many children's lives and their future development.

Congress agrees that a campaign is mounted to protect these services so that many young people can develop and make sure they can have a good quality of life and become well rounded and adjusted citizens.

167. WOMEN AND THE ECONOMY

This Congress notes that as the economic crisis deepens, workers, their families, and their communities face unprecedented challenges.

Congress is alarmed that Government proposals to counter economic gloom characterised by stagnant growth and inflation, consist of brutal cuts, driven by ideology, that will decimate the public sector workforce, affecting both workers and those who depend on public services.

Congress believes that the livelihoods of all workers are under attack, but that low-paid working women will be particularly affected by cuts to public spending. Congress supports the *There is a Better Way* campaign, which challenges the aggressive cuts agenda, and calls on the General Council to:

- Continue to highlight, through *There is a Better Way*, the gendered impacts of cuts, both on working women and on services;
- Continue to engage with the Equality and the Budget Advisory Group to ensure that budget processes are gendered;
- Continue to campaign for a Scottish living wage, which will have particular impact on the pay of the lowest paid workers, many of whom are women.

168. PUBLIC SPENDING

- 3. Only 100 MPs were required to vote for the Bill in the Commons to enable it to get through its Second Reading Stage.
- 4. Only 87 MPs felt the right to a democratic vote was important enough to stay behind in Westminster.
- 5. That significant numbers of GMB sponsored MPs did not vote for the bill.

This Congress believes:

- 6. That the method of talking-out a Bill to ensure there is no time for a genuine debate denied the democratic debate of the Bill and ensured the voice of workers' was once again silenced by the House of Commons.
- 7. That the real crime on the day was not the filibustering techniques of the predictable Tory MPs, but the failure of the Parliamentary Labour Party to support this mild, modest and moderate Bill.
- 8. That any GMB sponsored MP should have supported the bill as a matter of principal and in support of the aims of the GMB.

This Congress resolves:

- 9. To ask the CEC to consider withdrawing future support from any GMB sponsored MP who refused to support the bill.
- 10. To request that GMB sponsored MPs who obtain the opportunity to put forward an early day motion, put forward a bill consistent with the Lawful Industrial Action (Minor Errors) Bill at the earliest appropriate time.

©19 196. LAWFUL INDUSTRIAL ACTION BILL

This Congress deplores the fact that the majority of Labour MPs, including many GMB sponsored MPs, failed to support John McDonnell's Lawful Industrial Action Bill despite this winning the unanimous support of the TUC at their 2010 Congress. Congress is also concerned that many of our sponsored MPs fail to support GMB policies when debated in Parliament.

Congress instructs the CEC to carry out a review of our sponsored MPs voting records over a 6 month period of Parliamentary activity and to prepare a report for next year's Congress.

POLITICAL DEMOCRACY & CONSTITUTIONAL REFORM

199. FUNDING OF POLITICAL PARTIES

This Congress calls on the Government to restrict the donations that businesses and rich individuals give to political parties.

SELLAFIELD INDUSTRIAL BRANCH

Northern Region

200. WORKINGS OF PARLIAMENT

This Congress calls on the next Labour Government to implement reforms of Parliament, including sweeping away outdated procedural rules such as use of old style terms of debate and the voting lobby. Congress believes that the way the Scottish Parliament, Northern Ireland and Welsh Assemblies transact daily business is much more in tune with the twenty first century than the relative stuffiness of the Palace of Westminster. Congress believes that proper modernisation, including electronic voting, would be a much better use of time and taxpayers' money than the way that Parliament currently carries out the nation's business.

NORTH TYNE LA NO 1 BRANCH

201. REGIONAL GOVERNMENT

This Congress condemns the Coalition Government's proposals to scrap Regional Development Agencies such as One North East. Congress calls on the Government to put in place in the Northern Region a proper framework of regional governance that is democratically elected and with the type of devolved powers that exist in the nations of Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland.

SUNDERLAND NO 9 ENGINEERING BRANCH

Northern Region

202. LOCAL GOVERNMENT

This Government is appalled at the Coalition Government's cuts in public spending announced in October 2010 and notes that such cuts fly in the face of the same Government's announcements about local decision-making. Congress calls on the Government to fully resource local decision-making by devolving power to local councillors. Congress calls on the Labour Party to enshrine in its policy-making a proper commitment to localism by decentralising resources and power away from Whitehall to locally elected representatives and their communities.

This is having a detrimental impact upon our members who work for the Town Councils and then find themselves being 'divided' up between two or three or more Parish Councils, who will be unable to deliver any level of service within the tiny budgets they are allocated.

Congress supports the promotion through our political institutions and parliamentary representatives, legislation enshrined as part of the human rights act for all people of working age, the right to paid work and that forced unemployment would be clear breach of the human rights act if not acted upon by either local or national governments.

P20 PLYMOUTH BRANCH Southern Region

206. EUROPEAN COURT OF HUMAN RIGHTS

This Congress is greatly concerned that due to a ruling by the European Court of Human Rights criminals in prison should be eligible to vote in elections. A compliance deadline of August 2011 is in place which unless adhered to could mean that so called 'disenfranchised' prisoners would have the right to compensation. It is an uncomfortable state of affairs that someone in prison who has been found to have committed an offence against society, can expect to retain their right to vote, whilst serving a custodial sentence. What message is this sending out to the law abiding members of our society.

Congress calls upon the CEC to lobby Parliament to make sure that this right to vote is only given to those prisoners in custody for low level misdemeanours, those in custody for a year or less.

207. AFFILIATION TO REPUBLIC

This Congress agrees to affiliate to and support the organisation Republic which spearheads the campaign for an elected head of state.

This Congress notes with alarm that during these times of austerity millions of pounds are being wasted in paying for Prince Andrew to swan around the globe, consorting with dictators, supposedly for the benefit of British business. Congress calls on the government to make a well-directed cut and to stop subsidising his global trips.

POLITICAL RACISM & FASCISM

EP 209. FAR RIGHT GROUPS

This Congress calls for all of the main UK political parties to vigorously campaign against the British National Party, National Front, English Defence League and all associated organisations. Congress believes that, without a concerted effort by all believers in democracy, prejudice and discrimination will, once again, drive a wedge in UK communities.

SUNDERLAND NO 9 ENGINEERING BRANCH Northern Region

POLITICAL EUROPEAN UNION

210. LOCAL AUTHORITY OFFICES IN BRUSSELS

Congress condemns the short-sighted decision of the Conservative-led Government to abolish Regional Development Agencies and draws particular attention to the knock-on effects and closure of local authorities' offices in Brussels, where the GMB is the dominant trade union. At a time when the UK is suffering the full force of the government's ideologically-driven cuts, it is precisely now when the acquired knowledge and expertise of these Brussels offices in securing funding for projects in less affluent areas of the UK is needed. Therefore the EU's structural funds are more relevant than ever, as is the ability of local authorities to engage with the European legislative process as European legislation increasingly impacts on local authority work. Congress therefore calls on the CEC to raise the issue of funding for local authority offices in Brussels as a matter of urgency with the Secretary of State for Communities and Local Government.

SOCIAL POLICY JUSTICE

211. RIGHT TO LEGAL AID FOR WELFARE BENEFITS AND DEBT

This Congress is asked to support the "Justice for All" Campaign to prevent cuts to Legal Aid.

The Tory led Coalition Government is proposing to stop access to Legal Aid for people who wish to challenge welfare benefit decisions which can lead to a Tribunal hearing needing legal representation. They are also seeking to stop access to Legal Aid for people with debt problems and who also need free, independent and impartial debt advice and representation.

NORFOLK PUBLIC SERVICES BRANCH

212. LEGAL AID REFORMS

This Congress is deeply concerned about the Legal Aid reforms announced by the Conservative led Government in November 2010.

This reduction and contraction of the service will severely impact on people on low incomes and women in particular.

Under the new system proposed, anyone with assets worth more than £1,000 will have to pay at least £100 towards their legal costs and fees paid in civil and family cases.

Congress calls upon the CEC to campaign to restore the Legal Aid system to the level it was, which gives the most vulnerable in our society access to this vital service, particularly women who may suffer from domestic abuse. Although Legal Aid funding would still be retained for family law cases involving domestic abuse, forced marriages or child abduction, many women could be too frightened to take such traumatic action to free them from abuse, when they look at the mountain they may have to climb and possible financial costs which may be beyond their means.

213. JURY SERVICE - SOCIAL

This Congress recognises the fact that our members who are called up for jury service do not always receive expenses to reflect their wage loss.

We instruct the CEC to lobby the relevant bodies to revise the expense payment to reflect their actual loss of earnings.

R35 ROCESTER JCB BRANCH Birmingham & West Midlands Region

214. LEGAL SERVICES – JACKSON REPORT

This Congress notes with great concern, the Government's intention to implement, at least in part, Lord Justice Jackson's Review of Civil Litigation.

This report is a thinly disguised attack on injury victims and trade unions alike.

Just some of the proposals are:

- 1. The end of After the Event (ATE) insurance against losing a case
- 2. The millions currently paid out by insurers for disbursements in lost cases will no longer be available with injury victims and unions now being expected to pick up the tab
- 3. No success fee from insurers. This alone will cut at least 20% off costs insurers currently pay and will massively weaken the GMB's ability to fund and fight groundbreaking landmark cases
- 4. A return to the bad old days of contingency fees where lawyers take a percentage cut of injury victims' compensation.

Conference therefore calls on the GMB to continue its vigorous campaign in opposing these unfair and draconian proposals, aimed at benefiting insurance companies at the expense of injured victims and their funding trade unions.

Conference also calls on the GMB to ensure we never return to the bad old days where, to fund legal provision, an admin charge and/or deduction from compensation was made from injured members' entitlement.

SOCIAL POLICY EDUCATION & TRAINING

©23 215. OPPOSITION TO THE INTRODUCTION OF ACADEMIES IN THE STATE SECTOR

This Congress calls upon the GMB to continue to oppose the introduction of Academy Status to schools in the state sector; but also to press the Labour Party to reject the principle of Academy Status from Labour Party policy.

There were serious credibility questions about the previous Labour Government's policy to introduce Academy Status to help failing schools. However, the current government policy of offering Academy

Status to every school will destroy public accountability in education and the maintenance of equal opportunity for each child.

This Congress is aware that many Local Authorities are working towards a reduced schools infrastructure, on the basis that both primary and secondary schools will become academy schools. This assumption is not borne out by the comparatively low number of schools (primary and secondary) who have taken up Michael Gove's 'invitation'.

Congress agrees to continue its excellent work opposing the break up of the State Education system.

217. MORE INVESTMENT IN SCHOOL SPORTS FACILITIES

Congress condemns the Coalition Government, a mixture of two political parties who have implemented savage cuts within our local communities. These cuts are completely unnecessary and the rate that they are being implemented will have a devastating affect on communities where we live.

It is a travesty that cuts so savage to areas like education will have an impact on our children's lives and which will affect their health.

This Congress wishes the CEC to continue to fight the Coalition on the savage cuts to our members families. In addition the CEC campaigns to bring more funding from the government into areas of education through Local Authorities and not the private sector, or Academies, that would invest in sports facilities and education as a whole.

These sports facilities which the Tories have cut the funding to our essential part of the child's upbringing and education. We have seen many examples of obesity, diabetes, and long-term health problems from inept, inadequate sports facilities in schools which have cost the health service hundreds and thousands of pounds. Unless we get the Government to see sense and invest in education, especially around sports facilities and activities, then our children will face a lifetime of ongoing ill-health and detriment.

218. FREE SCHOOL MEALS

This Congress fundamentally disagrees with the Coalition Government's decision to cancel a planned extension to the universal free school meals pilot scheme and totally deplores the fact that the extension of free school meals to more low income families, due to start in September 2010, has been scrapped. Congress demands that the Government assists with the provision of more free school meals recognising the vital contribution they make in encouraging sound eating habits in early childhood, developing social skills, tackling childhood obesity, supporting local businesses through local procurement, creating jobs and helping to end child poverty.

219. TRADE UNION STUDIES AT SCHOOLS

This Congress calls for our children to be educated in schools. Politics and Trade Union studies must be on the curriculum in their final year. We need to educate our children in these topics so that they are fully aware and have an understanding of these subjects.

220. COMMUNITY FUNDING

This Congress calls upon the GMB to campaign in partnership with other Unions and Community Training Organisations to defend the funding for organisations delivering community based education and training.

The Government has without consultation raised the threshold of minimum contract values to £500,000 for those seeking funding from the Skills Funding Agency (SFA). It is estimated that of 800 providers only 200 will be able to contract directly. The remaining 600 will have to enter into "partnerships" with larger providers, e.g. colleges, to access their funding. In return the new partnership management can take 15% or more off the allocated agencies funding as their "management fees". We are aware that some colleges are charging above 20%. This will further reduce the actual funding available for education and training as well as leading to job losses in community agencies. These new arrangements, announced at the end of December, have to be in place between March and the Summer of 2011.

We ask the GMB to lobby for a restoration of the former arrangements for 12 months to allow consultation with the smaller agencies. We also ask that the "management fee" element be monitored closely to ensure larger agencies do not exploit their advantage in this relationship.

Severe damage will be done to community based education organisations delivering quality training where most needed. This runs contrary to the Government's "Big Society" initiative of encouraging local community agencies to deliver local services.

EP 221. APPRENTICESHIPS

This Congress has witnessed over the years the massive decline of traditional apprenticeships. Congress is firmly of the view that there is no substitute for a properly structured apprenticeship, with a combination of supervised and practical academic training. This would, without argument, give a generation of school leavers the opportunity to obtain life long skills and contribute to successful businesses and economic growth. Too much emphasis has been placed over the years on Education, Education, to the detriment of the skills needed to sustain areas such construction,

electrical, plumbing etc. much more could and should have been done to channel many young people into these areas and give them the practical training required.

222. EDUCATION AND APPRENTICESHIPS

This Congress calls on the Coalition Government and the Labour Government to provide tax incentives for businesses to employ apprentices. Congress calls for a re-balancing of education incentives to ensure that apprentices are not seen as a poorer alternative to further education.

© 20 227. SALE OF BRITAIN'S FORESTS

This Congress is totally opposed to the privatisation of the country's forests and calls on the CEC to vigorously campaign against the proposals.

©20 228. FORESTRY SELL OFF

This Congress is concerned about the plans by the Government to dispose of half of the woodland overseen by the Forestry Commission by 2020. It is a concern that the legislation which currently governs the treatment of 'ancient forests' such as the Forest of Dean is likely to be changed, giving private firms the right to cut down trees. These laws date back to the Magna Carta of 1215 and even some dating back further. The excuse that large amounts of forests would be sold, as DEFRA is seeking to make massive budget savings. Not only do we need to protect these ancient woodlands from private speculators, but we also need to ensure Britain's natural wildlife that inhabit these areas, many species already under threat, are protected. Once these precious areas are gone, in order to satisfy budget cuts and put the hands of private ownership, these areas of natural beauty could be destroyed.

Congress calls upon the CEC to make sure a campaign is mounted to fight the planned sell-off, not only to protect these areas of natural beauty for future generations, but the GMB have members employed in this sector and jobs could be under threat.

229. RESTRUCTURING OF COASTGUARD AND MARITIME AGENCIES

This Congress condemns Government proposals to reduce the number of coastguard facilities by 50% which we believe will adversely affect the public's safety. We call upon all Trade Unions to condemn the cuts, as well as all GMB sponsored M.P.'s to lobby Parliament to raise this issue at the highest level.

230. PRIVATISATION OF ROYAL MAIL - SUPPORT FOR CWU

This Congress welcomes the fact that the attempts of Lord Mandelson to part privatise Royal Mail received no mandate from the Labour movement.

In the face of coalition plans to fully privatise Royal Mail the GMB recognises the need to win widespread public support for opposition to these latest proposals.

The GMB calls upon Labour MP's and all trade unions to play their part in assisting the CWU (Communication Workers' Union) in its campaign to stop privatisation of Royal Mail.

231. ROYAL MAIL

This Congress calls on the Royal Mail to return a Sorting Office to Liverpool.

Z15 BRANCH

North West & Irish Region

232. A FAIR, OBJECTIVE PRESS

This Congress notes that, with a few notable exceptions, the press has never showed support to the Labour and Trade Union Movement. Over the past 30 years or so, this has changed from simple opposition to vitriolic and personal attacks. At the same time, the press support for the Tory Party, especially its right wing elements, has become more pronounced and sycophantic.

A free independent press, with objective reporting and presenting a plurality of views, is an essential part of a democratic society. However, the British press is not objective, nor does it cover a wide range of views. Unlike the trade unions it vilifies, the press is self regulated. To redress this imbalance, Congress calls for:

- 1. Replacement of the press complaints commission with a genuinely independent body, with powers to enforce proper redress for misreporting
- 2. An automatic right of reply for individuals and organisations
- 3. Access to the press for all political parties, except fascists, to allow for a wide range of views to be aired and debated.

PARKGATE BRANCH Yorkshire & North Derbyshire Region

233. NEWS INTERNATIONAL

This Congress notes the role of Murdoch's newspapers in the phone tapping scandal, and rejects the whole use of this type of journalism.

It expresses grave concerns of the influence that Murdoch has in the media of this country. This is a man who denounced his Australian Citizenship, and became an American so that he could buy the New York Times.

It further notes that whoever is in number ten Murdoch is one of the first through the door. This raises the question just who really runs Britain.

We therefore ask the CEC to look at ways to expose Murdoch's sinister role in our Political life, and fight to ensure that workers interests come before those of power mad billionaires.

EDMONTON/ENFIELD BRANCH London Region

234. SUPPORTING THE BBC, NOT SKY'S (VISUAL MUGGING)

This Congress supports the continued financing of the BBC, largely by the licence fee, as an exponent of quality broadcasting in comparison to the repetitive short change drivel served up by the likes of SKY TV which extorts further payments for anything of quality and interest and is largely financed by excessive advertising time, in effect, amounting to visual mugging.

ALFRETON NO.1 BRANCH Midland & East Coast Region

235. ABOLITION OF INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY ON MEDICATIONS

This Congress notes that in many countries of the world people are lacking basic vital needs such as universal medical health care. Many medications are unaffordable and people are condemned to die as a result.

For many diseases such as HIV, new molecules were discovered due to the efforts of public research funding. The pharmaceutical industry has become one of the most powerful in the world by buying the medication's copyright and by commercialising them.

The cost of medical treatment for the most serious diseases such as cancer and HIV is prohibitive in countries where there is no social security and is an important burden for the well functioning of our welfare system and the pharmaceutical industry has always refused to justify the high cost of these treatments. Our lives are more important than their profits.

Congress calls for the abolition of intellectual property on medications.

LONDON ENTERTAINMENT & IUSW BRANCH London Region

236. DRUG DEPENDENCY REDUCTION

This GMB Congress notes that in countries that have decriminalised drugs like Portugal the number of people addicted to injecting drugs has actually decreased as people are more likely to access help from services helping them with their addiction as they do not feel stigmatised or at risk of arrest and imprisonment.

This Conferences recognises that the criminalisation of drugs hinders policies that look to help people who are addicted, or have a drug habit and reduces people's access to the health service.

Congress believes that better information on drug safety and access to prevention materials in order to avoid contaminations of hepatitis and HIV is essential in the education of drug users and reduces the spread of such diseases.

GMB Congress therefore resolves to:

- a) Research both the positive and negative impacts of the decriminalisation of drugs in countries where this has happened and report to Congress 2012.
- b) Sign the Vienna declaration launched at the 2010 Global Aids Conference, calling for a scientific approach to drug policies instead of ideology.

GMB@PCS BRANCH London Region

237. CENTRAL EUROPEAN TIME

Congress supports the UK move to Central European Time (CET) and will positively respond in regard to any consultation re any potential change. If the political process moves to a possible trial period for a 1 Hour time change, the GMB will support this position. The wish is to align UK time with our main partners in Europe such as France and Germany. The proposal will be to operate on the current GMT in Autumn / Winter, to GMT + 1 and with BST in Spring / Summer, to BST + 1. The GMB believes there is pros and cons for such a move, but on balance, there is now compelling arguments, in the wider interest, to effect such a move.

X23 DOVER FERRIES BRANCH Southern Region

238. FUEL AND ENERGY PRICES

This Congress calls upon the GMB to campaign on behalf of the membership, especially those who drive for a living, to persuade the Government to examine the increasing cost of fuel and its negative impacts on the economy and livelihoods of our members.

We believe that the Government should restrict the amount of duty that is levied on fuel and that regulation is needed to control the way in which fuel companies price this essential product.

The relentless rises in gas, oil and electricity are impacting heavily upon the livelihoods of our members. We call for greater scrutiny and investigatory powers into the way the utility companies price their products and the profit levels they are achieving. This is to ensure that the general public are not being forced to shoulder an unfair share of the increased costs and if the prices are justified.

The relentless increase in fuel prices and utility charges, without appropriate scrutiny and the effective means to control prices within the industry, will lead to increased fuel poverty. These price increases are causing hardship and an increased burden is being levied on many sectors of society unable to increase their income to meet these costs.

239. SUPPORT TO COMMUNITIES

This Congress calls on the Coalition Government to provide support to communities and businesses by introducing energy price incentives. Such a move would help the whole economy to move forward in a time of the worst economic conditions for decades and would enable energy companies to keep in touch with their customers; some of whom are the most vulnerable in society and show that government is not wedded to the free market. Congress calls on the Labour Party to make energy policy and pricing a key part of its Internal Policy Review.

SOCIAL POLICY HOUSING

EP 240. SOCIAL HOUSING

This Congress notes the scandalous decision by the Coalition Government to cut the spending on Social Housing by 50%. Congress believes that the provision of decent and affordable standards of living is a basic human right and, in addition, for the stability of the wider housing market and the prevention of an unsustainable housing boom and bust, the UK must develop urgently a policy of council house building that is fully devolved and resourced from Whitehall.

DURHAM COUNTY LOCAL AUTHORITY BRANCH

241. PROVISION OF SOCIAL HOUSING 2011

This Congress accepts that the National Housing Policy is a disgrace and it instructs the CEC to organise and campaign at all levels for the following :

- 1. Right to buy subsidy to be controlled by a sliding repayment of this subsidy if the property is re-sold within five (5) years of purchase.
- 2. All long term empty properties to be compulsory purchased at a value that represents any costs that maybe required making them fit for habitation.
- 3. All Housing Associations or other bodies who have taken local authority housing property over taken back into Local Authority controlled.
- 4. A social house building programme, year on year until we exhaust the need.

Congress therefore instructs the CED to start this campaign at the end of this Congress.

242. HOUSING

This Congress calls on the devolution of housing revenue and policy to the regions of the UK. Congress believes that one of the best ways to establish a proper regional policy that is run for local communities, by local communities, is to take away the power of Whitehall to run the lives of local people. Congress believes that one of the key ways to establish this principle is to decentralise housing revenue accounts to local councils, including housing receipts, so that local democratic decision-making with local accountability can help regenerate local areas.

EP 243. SOCIAL/COUNCIL HOUSING

This Congress is seriously concerned at the appalling lack of social/council housing that is available throughout the UK.

We note the pressures that are put on our members and their families to get on the housing ladder.

We demand that a future Labour Government immediately addresses this with a clear commitment to start a social/council house building programme as soon as it is elected.

SOCIAL POLICY WELFARE RIGHTS & SERVICES

258. OPPOSITION ON THE ATTACKS ON WELFARE

This Congress notes:

- 1. That the Conservative led government has instituted a programme of cuts to welfare benefits that total £15.9 billion.
- 2. That the Institute for Fiscal Studies analysis confirms that the impact of the cuts disproportionately hits those on lower incomes or who are out of work especially the proposed cuts and changes to housing benefit.
- 3. The government's proposal to merge all benefits into one 'universal credit'.
- 4. The idea of a Citizens Income, a unconditional income guaranteed by the state.

This Congress believes:

- 5. That the Conservative led government's proposals are ideologically motivated.
- 6. That the impact of the cuts to welfare will further widen the gap between rich and poor and will make some city centres no go areas for those on low incomes.
- 7. That rent caps and rent controls would be a fairer and more effective solution to the rising housing benefit bill.
- 8. That the caps imposed upon benefits are arbitrary and unfair. The caps applied will also only make a bad situation worse for many people.
- 9. That cuts and restrictions on benefits make the working class pay for a crisis we did not cause.
- 10. That any reform of our welfare system should be in the interests of societies most vulnerable and done in a way that realises the founding universal ideals of the welfare state.
- 11. That this government is incapable of doing is and that its 'reforms' of welfare are designed with one goal in end; to reduce expenditure with no concern for the human consequence.
- 12. That the proposal for a universal credit, as it is currently envisaged, should be opposed.
- 13. That instead a British Citizen should be provided with a guaranteed minimum citizen's income which would strengthen the welfare state and realise its founding ideals. The

specifics of such a policy and its implementation would need further consideration but the principle should be supported.

This Congress resolves too:-

- 14. Oppose this government's efforts to dismantle the welfare state through 'reform' and cutting back welfare spending.
- 15. Organise opposition to this government's agenda among those most affected groups as well as supporting existing campaigns.
- 16. Actively campaign for the introduction of a Citizens Income

259. COMPULSORY WORK PLACEMENTS

Each year approximately ten billion pounds is unclaimed, yet the Government is cutting benefits for the most needy. They talk about benefit fraud, when they actually fraudulently take money out of the pockets of the working men and women's pockets.

262. HOUSING

This Congress agrees that we cannot overlook the fact that the previous government in all of its 13 years did not tackle the housing problem as it should have.

However, the current proposals by the Coalition Government to cap benefits will create distress for millions of people and none more so than the cap on Housing Benefit. This is an ideologically policy designed to socially engineer the landscape of the UK.

It will split families. It will remove children from schools. It will drive people away from their place of work. It will create ghettos. It will cause untold hardship. This Congress calls on a fundamental reappraisal of social care policy in England. Congress believes that the policy of UK Governments to adopt a different social care model in England from those that are devolved to the Parliaments and Assemblies of the rest of the UK, is unsustainable. Congress calls on a fresh start to be made so that older people are not driven into poverty and further calls on the Labour Party to ensure that a renewed commitment to fully resourced social care within the public sector forms part of its Internal Policy Review.

EP 264. SOCIAL CARE

This Congress calls for the Coalition Government to change the way Social Care Funding Policy is currently undertaken in England. Not only do these long distance placements often traumatise children who are already damaged and vulnerable, the children are then open to criminality, drug abuse and sexual exploitation being so far away from their original home environment.

This Congress calls upon a closer study on why these children are being placed in areas far from their place of origin.

This Congress should do all in its power to deter this and future Governments from infringing on the rights of all our pensioners to a life of dignity, which is the least they have long earned to expect.

This Congress calls on the Coalition Government to provide sustained support for pensioners in relation to energy bills at a time when fuel costs are rising at an alarming rate. This Congress notes with concern reports of widespread manipulation of advance votes during the recent Burmese elections, boycotted by the National League for Democracy. Congress believes that this is yet another blow to the prospects for democracy in Burma and dismissed this election as no more than a sham to reinforce the ruling regime's power. Congress urges the Government to make further representations for the immediate and unconditional release of more than 2,200 prisoners of conscience currently detained in Burma.

©22 271. AFFILIATION TO BURMA CAMPAIGN

Conference notes that despite a landslide election victory in 1990 for Aung San Suu Kyi and her party 'the National League for Democracy (NLD)', the military junta in Burma continues to refuse to recognise the results of that election. Instead she has spent the vast majority of the last 20 years under house arrest whilst human rights abuses are widespread and torture is institutionalised.

Rape, murder, torture, detention without trial and forced labour are rife in Burma. Freedom of expression is forbidden and surveillance is endemic, the junta has passed legislation to imprison individuals for up to 20 years for opposing government policies.

We are calling for a co-ordinated union campaign to increase pressure on UK companies to sever any ties with Burma. Burma Campaign UK wrote to leading retailers to see if they have any trade links within the country, several companies refused to acknowledge the campaign including Animal, Bay Trading and Lillywhites. UK insurance company Lloyds of London refuse to cease insuring the Burmese government claiming it was anti competitive; their money is supporting these human rights abuses. Barclays Bank has agreed to pay fines for breaching sanctions against Burma. Foreign financial services are assisting the Burmese government to loot the national resources.

We call on the Congress to condemn the fake elections that will be held in November 2010 set to be held under deeply oppressive conditions designed to perpetuate military rule.

We believe that the GMB should affiliate to the Burma Campaign UK to fully participate in efforts to bring freedom and human rights to the people of Burma.

272. COLOMBIA

Despite the election of the new Colombian President, Juan Manuel Santos, who came into office in August 2010 with promises of improvements to the dire human rights situation, attacks and threats against Trade Unionists and other human rights defenders have continued at the same tragically high rate since his inauguration allied with continuing impunity from prosecution (in over 98% of the cases in which a trade unionist is killed in Colombia, nobody is brought to justice). Congress calls on the CEC to write to MPs and MEPs calling on them to not to support the EU-Colombia Free Trade Agreement without a clear set of human rights benchmarks and to contact the Colombian Government to state their resolve to continue to actively oppose any such trade deal until we see real and

meaningful progress to end the violence and attacks faced by trade unionists and other human rights defenders.

273. WORKERS' RIGHTS

This Congress welcomes the publication of the International Trade Union Confederation's (ITUC) annual survey of trade union rights, which documents a dramatic increase in the number of trade unionists murdered last year. Congress notes that there were 101 killings, an increase of 30 per cent over the previous year and further notes that this invaluable report records an extensive list of violations suffered by trade unionists struggling to defend workers' interests in 140 countries. Congress supports the view that the survey shows that the majority of the world's workers still lack effective protection of their rights to organise trade unions and bargain collectively, which is a major factor in the long-term increase in economic inequality within and between countries, and that inadequate incomes for much of the world's workforce helped cause the global economic crisis and are making it much harder to put the economy on a path of sustainable growth.

274. UN SECURITY COUNCIL

This Congress calls for a fundamental review of the UN Security Council to reflect a changed geo-political world view; to include emerging economies and reflect a much changed world order.

275. SUPPORT FOR SEX WORKERS' UNIONISATION AT AN INTERNATIONAL LEVEL

This Congress notes that sex workers are said to be the oldest profession but we are also among the youngest unionised workers. Thanks to GMB, sex workers have the right to join a trade union in the UK since 2004. Article 23 of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights states "everyone has the right to form and to join trade unions for the protection of his interests" but in most countries around the world, sex workers are still denied this right.

As Trade Unionists we know the solution to exploitation and abuses within any industry is the promotion of full human, civil and labour rights for those working within it. We call for sex workers' entitlement to these rights to be recognised and respected within the union movement.

Congress calls for the support of sex workers' unionisation within the international Labour Movement.

LONDON ENTERTAINMENT & IUSW BRANCH London Region

276. GMB AND THE PALESTINE SOLIDARITY CAMPAIGN

This Congress applauds the stand taken by GMB in seconding the historic Composite Motion 18 on Palestine at the last TUC Congress.

Paragraph 6 of that motion instructed the Central Executive Council to "work closely with the Palestine Solidarity Campaign to actively encourage affiliates, employers and pension funds to disinvest from, and boycott goods of, companies who profit from illegal settlements, the Occupation and the construction of the Wall".

Given the continued occupation of Palestinian land and the construction of more illegal settlements thereon since the passing of the motion, Congress believes that much stronger action to increase political and economic pressure on the State of Israel is required and that this Union should take a lead in driving forward the disinvestment and boycott initiatives called for in the above paragraph.

One of the companies which continues to profit from the occupation and the servicing of the illegal settlements, and in which this union has significant numbers of members, is Veolia. In this country and others around the world, Veolia has lost substantial contracts at local government level not just because its bids have been undercut by other companies but also because of co-ordinated lobbying the pressure groups to highlight its business links and investments in such projects as the Jerusalem Light Railway and bus routes which connect Israeli territory to the illegal settlements, and waste disposal contracts and facilities which aid the establishment of such illegal settlements on Palestinian land. Not only are our members made indirectly complicit in illegal activities (as defined by the Geneva Convention on Human Rights), bit their job security is ultimately undermined by Veolia's vulnerability to exclusion from contracts. It is therefore in the interests of our members that the company ceases such dubious business practices and stops giving succour to colonialist occupation.

Congress therefore instructs the CEC to seek the support of the Palestine Solidarity Campaign in the coordination of a campaign to make public the activities of Veolia in Israel and the Occupied Palestinian Territories and to encourage the company to disinvest from activities which run counter to this Union's commitments to justice for Palestinians in the TUC motion.

277. TORTURE AND RENDITION

This Congress calls on the UK Coalition Government and the Labour Party to give an unequivocal commitment that it will never use torture, condone torture or allow rendition or torture in any of its jurisdiction or territories. Congress believes that the use of torture is fundamentally against the Geneva Convention and undermines a free society when that society's Governments are perceived to have condoned it in the past.

SUNDERLAND CITY LA BRANCH Northern Region

278. RETURN OF HISTORICAL ARTEFACTS

This Congress believes the theft of artwork and historical artefacts is a crime against humanity. The plundering of galleries and museums by Nazi Germany is, quite rightly, universally condemned. However, many museums throughout the world, particularly in Europe, continue to hold items obtained via dubious means. They often take a chauvinistic and patronising attitude and use spurious legal arguments to justify not returning these items to their country of origin. Examples include the Parthenon Friezes (aka Elgin Marbles) in the British Museum and the Bust of Nefertiti in Berlin's Neuse Museum.

Congress calls on museums to work with UNESCO in order to return artefacts of cultural importance to their country of origin. Where items are of genuine importance to more than one country, (e.g. the Rosetta Stone), we call for multi-national ownership, under the supervision of UNESCO.

Rule 6 Appeals Procedure for members

- 1 Any member who wants to complain must do so to their branch secretary, who will take the matter to the branch. If the member is not satisfied with the branch's decision or the branch decides it does not have the authority to deal with the matter, the member can appeal in writing to the regional committee within one month of the branch meeting. The regional committee will make the final decision.
- 2 At each hearing before the branch or the regional committee, the member will have a reasonable opportunity
 - · to present their case orally or in writing
 - to support their case with written statements or by using witnesses
 - to hear the evidence against their complaint, to answer it and to question witnesses.

RA282

Amend:

- "1. Any member who wants to complain must do so to their Branch Secretary, who will take the matter to the Branch. If the member is not satisfied with the Branch's decision, the member can appeal in writing to the Regional Committee within one month of the Branch meeting. The Regional Committee will make the final decision.
- 2. WASTE RECYCLING

PENSION INDEXATION

This Congress is appalled by the disgraceful efforts by the Coalition Government to downgrade pensions to be based on CPI (Consumer Price Index) as opposed to RPI (Retail Price Index). Also the winter fuel payments could be looked at for reduction, even though massive price increases in fuel for heating and petrol/diesel have happened U.K wide.

STATE PENSION AGE

This Congress deplores the changes to State Pensions announced by the Conservative led Government, in particular the approximate 30,000 women who will be forced to work for two years longer than they had previously planned because of the increases to the State Pensions age entitlement

This Congress recognises that the removal of retirement age and the extension of qualifying age to draw the state pension adversely affects female workers who face losing anything up to an average of £38,000 if they ever actually get to draw it.

Women born between 5th March and 5th April 1954 would have been due to start drawing their State Pension when they reached 64, but the Government has moved the goal posts and this group of women will have to wait until they are 66. A total of 5.1 million people will be affected by the plans to increase the State Pension age to 66 between 2018 and 2020, but this particular group will face the longest wait of two years.

The Government Pensions Minister has defended this change stating that this only represents one per cent of the 2.6 million women who will be affected by these changes. Once again women are being penalised. Many in this particular group may not have another pension to retire on and having planned their retirement age will now have to rethink their plans with only seven years to prepare.

Congress therefore calls upon the CEC to lobby against these changes, and on the GMB to mount a vigorous campaign to defend the pensions of our whole membership; in particular our women members who will be affected adversely.

This Congress condemns this Tory led Government for its attack and misinformation on Public Service Pensions which, together with their proposal to increase members' contributions, will be a detriment to members to the benefit of the Treasury.

EMPLOYMENT RIGHTS

Congress notes with grave concern press reports that this Tory led Con-Dem Coalition Government are seeking to legislate over the rights of workers to bring employment tribunal claims. It further notes the role

of Liberal Democrat, Vince Cable in the defence of the Employers and reminds Congress that this worm was once a member of the Labour Party.

We campaign for employment rights from day one. This law will severely limit our members' ability to receive fairness in the workplace by extending the qualifying period when an employee can take a claim to an Employment Tribunal to two years (currently the period is after 1 year's employment).

Congress is concerned *and* will do everything in its power to campaign against the proposed changes coming from the coalition Government which denies workers rights and costs. Any attempt to reduce the employment rights of workers should be challenged. Congress will oppose these regressive proposals *and* such action as to change the current qualifying period from the current one year for claims for unfair dismissal and extend the time from one year our members can challenge them in tribunal etc.

Congress instructs the CEC and the Senior Management Team to use all avenues to oppose the attack on workers rights and changes by this Con-Dem Government.

PRIVATE HIRE AND HACKNEY CARRIAGE INDUSTRY

This Congress notes that owing to the unemployment caused by the bankers casino activities, exacerbated by the wrong headed policy of draconian cutbacks by the ConDem government, tens if not hundreds of thousands are flooding into the Hackney Carriage and Private Hire Industry on a national basis.

Owing to fundamentally weak and flawed regulations within the industry brought about by free market ideology, the ease with which people can obtain a licence means:-

- 1. There are increasing numbers in the industry who cannot undertake basic communication, calculating and driving duties. Topographical testing and communication skill levels are frequently appalling. Councils have little or no concern for the viability of this extremely important aspect of the public transport infrastructure.
- 2. Members of the travelling public and drivers are coming under increasing health and safety risks, many drivers work 80 plus hours a week and are in a continuous state of tiredness. Vast numbers of these drivers gave contracts to transport the young, elderly and infirm, naturally their tiredness presents an appalling risk to other road users.

3. Professional drivers who can do the job properly are being driven out of the industry, repossession and bankruptcy are rife. Drivers in some parts of Essex have resorted to living in caravans and one driver to our knowledge lives in his vehicle. Tory dogma on market forces is creating a situation of grave danger to the public and is literally life destroying for those working in it.

This Congress demands a full public enquiry into the misbehaviour of the police nationwide in continuously declining to attend emergency calls by Hackney Carriage and Private Hire Drivers. 13 have been murdered on the job in the last 15 months drink and drink fuelled scum obviously worry not about being apprehended.

Clearly drivers safety matters little to the police but they always manage to turn out in force to attack demonstrators, sometimes resulting in demonstator's deaths. Surely a situation needing the most stringent investigation

Congress therefore instructs the National Union to highlight these issues publicly and to raise the issue in the Labour Party with the objective of developing a policy that can eliminate these dangers once a Labour Government is returned to office.

Many commentators from the left and right believe that the only way out of this recession is to strengthen the UK Manufacturing sector. To do this will require a positive attitude towards the sector, one that this government is yet to show. In fact at its first opportunity it showed the opposite by withdrawing the Labour government's promised loan to Sheffield Forge Master.

This Congress now calls upon the Coalition Government to widen support to produce the growth required to create much needed employment and sustain jobs. Congress, therefore, calls for a Promote British Manufacturing Policy to be a fundamental part of government policy and the Whitehall machine.

TAX AVOIDANCE AND TAX EVASION

Congress notes that Governments have become too close to the City as the UK increasingly puts its economic faith in the financial services sector.

Congress is appalled that, over the last thirty years, successive Governments have sought to enable tax avoidance and failed to address, effectively, the increase in tax evasion. Congress notes, with alarm, the failure of the Labour leadership to give unequivocal policy direction on future taxation policy.

This Congress calls for a high profile campaign on future attempts to public service cuts by exposing the amount of tax evasions.

This Congress condemns the super rich in this country who are avoiding payment of taxes *and* calls on the Coalition Government to bring in zero tolerance for those in society that seek to dodge and avoid their responsibilities as taxpayers; especially among the very well off in the UK who are costing the Exchequer up to £100 billion p.a. So you will have the spectre of an ex council employee doing their old job in return for the jobseekers allowance.

Charities are working flat out, within their means, to supplement public services. They are unable and unwilling to fill the gap that will be left. Volunteers are difficult enough to find without them being siphoned off by local authorities to do their work. Local authority spending is being squeezed, leaving precious little for the support of charities. We welcome the idea of the big society; this is something the Labour movement has believed in from the start and why we support fair taxes (from each according to their ability to each according to their need). However, this needs proper funding and should not be at the expense of our members' jobs and the needy.

This Congress therefore calls upon HM Government to promote a truly inclusive society, by supporting with sufficient funding, local and national authorities, government workers and charities, that provide services for the community.

This Congress acknowledges the role played by affiliated trade unions as an integral part of the Labour Party.

Congress notes emphatically that it is the Labour Party's links with the trade union movement which distinguish the Labour Party from other political parties in Britain. Historically, the trade union movement was the leading force in the creation of the Labour Party formed by working people in trade unions. The Labour Party was established as the political wing of the trade union movement.

Throughout the twentieth century affiliated unions provided the bulk of the Labour Party's financial support, as well as campaigning at election time for the election of a Labour government. This Congress notes the efforts and hard work of Full Time and Lay Officials to work with other Trade Unions and the Labour Party for the benefit of our members and the general public.

Careerists and carpetbaggers in the Labour Party are trying to use discussions about how the Labour Party moves forward, to change the dynamic within the Labour movement. This Congress calls on such people to be unmasked, not just for who they are but for what they are, and calls on the Labour Party to forge a much closer working relationship with the Trade Union movement.

Therefore this Congress condemns those within the Labour movement who wish the link between the Labour Party and the trade union movement to be broken *and* opposes proposals that the role played by trade unions in the Labour Party should be reduced or even scrapped completely. Congress resolves to further strengthen these links with other Trade Unions and the Labour Party.

Congress also singles out for particular condemnation the attacks on the link between the trade unions and the Labour Party which are voiced by newspapers which called for a vote for the Tories or the Lib Dems in the 2010 general election. The mass media, especially those which openly back the Tories or the Lib Dems, should have no say in how the labour movement conducts its internal affairs.

THE LAWFUL INDUSTRIAL ACTION (MINOR ERRORS) BILL

This Congress deplores the fact that the majority of Labour MPs, including many GMB sponsored MPs, failed to support John McDonnell's Lawful Industrial Action Bill despite this winning the unanimous support of the TUC at their 2010 Congress. Congress is also concerned that many of our sponsored MPs fail to support GMB policies when debated in Parliament. Congress instructs the CEC to carry out a review of our sponsored MPs voting records over a 6 month period of Parliamentary activity and to prepare a report for next year's Congress.

This Congress notes:

- 1. That this bill initiated by John McDonnell MP was aimed at reducing the ability of employer's to bring injunctions against unions that have attempted to follow the extremely complex and technical balloting procedures for official industrial action.
- 2. That the bill failed to progress in the Commons following dirty parliamentary tactics employed by the Tories and a lack of support from Labour MPs.
- 3. Only 100 MPs were required to vote for the Bill in the Commons to enable it to get through its Second Reading Stage.
- 4. Only 87 MPs felt the right to a democratic vote was important enough to stay behind in Westminster.
- 5. That significant numbers of GMB sponsored MPs did not vote for the bill.

This Congress believes:

- 6. That the method of talking-out a Bill to ensure there is no time for a genuine debate denied the democratic debate of the Bill and ensured the voice of workers' was once again silenced by the House of Commons.
- 7. That the real crime on the day was not the filibustering techniques of the predictable Tory MPs, but the failure of the Parliamentary Labour Party to support this mild, modest and moderate Bill.
- 8. That any GMB sponsored MP should have supported the bill as a matter of principal and in support of the aims of the GMB.

This Congress resolves:

- 9. To ask the CEC to consider withdrawing future support from any GMB sponsored MP who refused to support the bill.
- 10. To request that GMB sponsored MPs who obtain the opportunity to put forward an early day motion, put forward a bill consistent with the Lawful Industrial Action (Minor Errors) Bill at the earliest appropriate time.

BRITAIN'S FORESTS

This Congress is concerned about the plans by the Government to dispose of half of the woodland overseen by the Forestry Commission by 2020; large amounts of forests would be sold. DEFRA is seeking to make massive budget savings.

It is a concern that the legislation which currently governs the treatment of 'ancient forests' such as the Forest of Dean is likely to be changed, giving private firms the right to cut down trees. These laws date back to the Magna Carta of 1215 and even some dating back further.

This Congress is totally opposed to the privatisation of the country's forests and calls on the CEC to campaign vigorously. Not only do we need to protect these ancient woodlands from private speculators, but we also need to ensure Britain's natural wildlife that inhabit these areas, many species already under threat, are protected. Once these precious areas are gone, in order to satisfy *and* excuse budget cuts, and put the hands of private ownership, these areas of natural beauty could be destroyed.

Congress calls upon the CEC to make sure a campaign is mounted against the proposals *and* fight the planned sell-off, not only to protect these areas of natural beauty for future generations. The GMB have members employed in this sector and jobs could be under threat.

NATIONAL HEALTH SERVICE REFORMS

Congress we are proud of the NHS and our members who deliver a world class service and the improvement to the general health of the nation over the last 60 years.

This Congress condemns *and* deplores what Cameron and his Tory Lib-Dem Coalition are doing to the NHS. This unwarranted attack on its very foundation is the biggest broken promise of them all by a Conservative Prime Minister who will destroy universal health care across England by unleashing a free-market tsunami. Congress believes that the increasing market provision threatens the principles upon which the National Health Service was founded.

Congress calls on the Coalition Government to scrap its policy of devolving Health Budgets to GPs. It is clear that their proposals will in time deliver our National Health Service to the Private Sector whose sole objective is greed not need. This will harm patients and create possible closures of many NHS hospitals across the country.

We call on the GMB at all levels, national, regional and branch to actively oppose the insidious attacks on the NHS by the Con-Dem coalition. The NHS is a world renowned institution that we should all stand up and fight for.

This Congress agrees the GMB will campaign and oppose any break-up of universal healthcare in the UK. This Congress believes that the GMB should work closely with the TUC to oppose any reforms that the Con-Dem Government is introducing regarding the NHS. We must now in conjunction with other NHS Unions do everything possible to expose the hypocrisy of the Tory led proposals and defend the NHS in its present form.

Congress further calls on the Labour Party to give a commitment to repeal the Coalition Government's policy when next in power and therefore instructs GMB to lobby Labour MPs to keep the national in the Health Service and stop any privatisation.

BURMA CAMPAIGN

This Congress notes with concern reports of widespread manipulation of advance votes during the recent Burmese elections, boycotted by the National League for Democracy. Congress believes that this is yet another blow to the prospects for democracy in Burma and dismissed this election as no more than a sham to reinforce the ruling regime's power. Congress urges the Government to make further representations for the immediate and unconditional release of more than 2,200 prisoners of conscience currently detained in Burma.

Conference notes that despite a landslide election victory in 1990 for Aung San Suu Kyi and her party 'the National League for Democracy (NLD)', the military junta in Burma continues to refuse to recognise the results of that election. Instead she has spent the vast majority of the last 20 years under house arrest whilst human rights abuses are widespread and torture is institutionalised.

Rape, murder, torture, detention without trial and forced labour are rife in Burma. Freedom of expression is forbidden and surveillance is endemic, the junta has passed legislation to imprison individuals for up to 20 years for opposing government policies.

We are calling for a co-ordinated union campaign to increase pressure on UK companies to sever any ties with Burma. Burma Campaign UK wrote to leading retailers to see if they have any trade links within the country, several companies refused to acknowledge the campaign including Animal, Bay Trading and Lillywhites. UK insurance company Lloyds of London refuse to cease insuring the Burmese government claiming it was anti competitive; their money is supporting these human rights abuses. Barclays Bank has agreed to pay fines for breaching sanctions against Burma. Foreign financial services are assisting the Burmese government to loot the national resources.

We call on the Congress to condemn the fake elections that will be held in November 2010 set to be held under deeply oppressive conditions designed to perpetuate military rule.

We believe that the GMB should affiliate to the Burma Campaign UK to fully participate in efforts to bring freedom and human rights to the people of Burma.

OPPOSITION TO ACADEMIES

This Congress calls upon the GMB to continue to oppose the introduction of Academy Status to schools in the state sector; but also to press the Labour Party to reject the principle of Academy Status from Labour Party policy.

There were serious credibility questions about the previous Labour Government's policy to introduce Academy Status to help failing schools. The current government policy of offering Academy Status to every school will destroy public accountability in education and the maintenance of equal opportunity for each child.

This Congress is aware that many Local Authorities are working towards a reduced schools infrastructure, on the basis that both primary and secondary schools will become academy schools.

Congress agrees to continue its excellent work opposing the break up of the State Education system.

CEC STANCES on EXISTING POLICY MOTIONS

The following outlines the stance adopted by the Central Executive Council towards each motion deemed as **Existing Policy** at its meetings in March and April.

56. ASBESTOS

Existing Policy as agreed in Composite 2 carried at Congress 2010

92. THE OUTLAWING OF CONTRACTUAL EMPLOYMENT

The branch has confirmed that it is calling for the outlawing of contracting out, rather than contractual employment. This is in line with Existing Policy from Composite 5 carried at Congress 2010 (the Motion is from one of the same two branches in that Composite).

93. AGENCY LABOUR

Agreed at Congress 2010, Composite 4. GMB is acting on that decision in the face of threats to the Regulation by Coalition Government, but there is no need for debate.

94. PROTECTION OF AGENCY WORKERS

Agreed at Congress 2010, Composite 4. GMB is acting on that decision in the face of potential threats to the Regulation by Coalition Government, but there is no need for debate.

135. SECTION 188 NOTICES

The motion asks GMB to continue to highlight and fight against dismissal and re-engagement notices as GMB has been doing for some time.

145. PRIVATE FINANCE INITIATIVE (PFI)

The motion is anti-PFI which has been GMB policy for some time.

189. LABOUR PARTY

This motion is supporting a full leadership contest for the Labour Party which is in line with Composite 17 which was passed at Congress 2007.

190. THATCHER'S CHILDREN

This motion calls on the GMB to work with the Labour Party to return the party to power. As GMB is affiliated to the Labour Party it is a constant objective of GMB to work to ensure Labour's electoral success. It is also evident in Motion 101 passed at Congress 2010 where our commitment to the Labour Party was restated.

191. JOIN THE LABOUR PARTY

This motion calls on the GMB to encourage its members to join the Labour Party which is existing GMB policy passed at Congress 2007 in Motion 181.

192. GMB POLITICAL CANDIDATES

This motion calls for GMB regions to approve and maintain their own list which is already current practice in many regions.

193. GMB SUPPORT FOR ELECTED REPRESENTATIVES

This motion calls for elected representatives like MPs or MSPs not to hold additional employment. This motion is existing policy that was passed at Congress 2008 with Composite 6 and Congress 2009, motion 157.

209. FAR RIGHT GROUPS

This motion calls for the main political parties to fight against fascist far right parties such as the BNP, National Front and English Defence League. This is in line with existing policy with motion 202 passed at Congress 2007.

221. APPRENTICESHIPS

In line with existing policy to pursue the reintroduction of traditional apprenticeships (composite 32, carried at GMB Congress 2006; and composite 21, carried at GMB Congress 2007).

240. SOCIAL HOUSING

This motion calls for a fully resourced council house building programme. This motion is in line with existing policy passed at Congress 2007 with motion 228.

243. SOCIAL/COUNCIL HOUSING

This motion calls for a future Labour Government to immediately address the lack of social/council housing which is fully in line with existing policy passed at Congress 2007 with motion 228.

263. SOCIAL CARE

This motion calls for fundamental change to the way in which social care is currently provided in England and refers to the different levels of provision in Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland. GMB has long campaigned for a universal national social care service free at the point of delivery, fully funded through general taxation, not from service-users through the use of one-off lump sum payments or private insurance. The motion is identical to existing GMB policy.

264. SOCIAL CARE

This motion calls on government to change the way social care is funded in England and calls for upward harmonisation to the policy applied in Scotland. GMB has long campaigned for a universal national social care service free at the point of delivery, fully funded through general taxation, not from service-users through the use of one-off lump sum payments or private insurance. The motion is identical to existing GMB policy.

266. PENSIONERS' DIGNITY

GMB policy of many years standing and reflected in regular motions to TUC Conference.

267. FUEL COSTS

Several motions on Winter Fuel Allowances have been carried by past Congresses. In particular, EM4 carried at Congress 2008 debated Pensioners Fuel Poverty and the choice between heating and eating; Composite 11 carried at Congress 2008 called for an index linked increase in Winter Fuel Allowance to reflect the increasing price of fuel and to compliment this, Composite 20, carried at Congress 2010 sought ways to help the elderly with their winter fuel bills by moving the qualifying age and by looking at how the cold winter £25 Allowance is paid.

268. PROVISION OF FREE DENTAL TREATMENT FOR PENSIONERS

GMB Policy, most recently restated at GMB Congress 2006 (Composite Motion C33) is for <u>all</u> NHS services, including dental treatment, to be free at the point of delivery for everybody.

269. BURMA

The motion reaffirms GMB's position on free trade unions in Burma, as carried at Congress 2009, motion 225.
